The democratic state convention was a Cleveland convention from top to bottom and the DEMOCRAT takes a pardonable pride in the fact of having contributed its help in making it so.

The Indiana state democratic convention met today, and it is safe to say her delegate will be for Cleveland after giving Gray a complimentary vote.

As was predicted in these columns several days ago the democrats of Indiana have instructed for Cleveland. In case of the failure of the candidacy of Cleveland the delegation will support Gray.

President Eliot of Harvard college is in Portland. In an interview with a Telegram reporter he said that Cleveland can carry Massachusetts easily but that the Hill men would knife him in New York and that this practically ruins his possibility of success.

It is probable that the democratic state central committee may secure the services of Captain George W Bell to lecture during the state canvass on the tariff and other economic questions. Captain Bell is not a partisan but he teaches the true faith with a zeal and vigor that is truly refreshing. We trust the voters of Oregon may have the privilege of hearing the "silver tongued orator of Iowa."

Quite a number of democratic politicians in Oregon who, two months ago, were strong Hill men, were seen at the state convention this week clambering and stumbling over each other in their zealous effort to get under the Cleveland shelter before the torrents began to fall. The time has come when politicians have to fall in and drill when the people point out the way. It is much easier now for the masses to lead the politicians than it is for the politicians to lead the masses.

A majority of the democrats of Oregon do not really like Grover Cleveland, but as he was the head of the only democratic administration the country has known within a generation, it was thought necessary to point with pride to Grover Cleveland.

This statement is devoid of truth, and if the Portland cotemporary could descend to come from the high perch he occupies down among the people he would find seven-tenths of the democrats who declare they like Cleveland because they believe implicitly in his integrity and honesty both in public and private life.

Two years later he was present in Peoria when the committee informed Mr Lincoln of his nomination, and was gratified to hear the future War president say, as he took out a printed slip containing the prophecy, "Young man, you see that I have kept your prediction."

YES, REMOVE IT.

A Washington special to the Tribune, Rep., says there is something to the free-sugar scheme of the majority of the ways and means committee. They have had several talks among themselves, and the weight of opinion seems to be in favor of reporting a bill removing the duty of 12 cent per pound from refined sugars. Should the bill be reported, it would pass the house by an almost unanimous vote. We trust the reader will not fail to note the fact that in the case of sugar, just etc., McKimley put raw material on the free list and left a protective duty on refined sugar, jute sacks, binding twine, etc. This course was evidently dictated by the lordly manufacturers and managers of sugar trusts, and cordage combines, in return for which these trusts and combines contributed freely of the swag made out of protection to carry elections as was notoriously done in Rhode Island not many days since. Yes, break up these trusts so carefully fostered by republican legislation.

It is in the logic of things that the Wall street junta should seek to down Governor Penoyer. But that is no reason why a democratic state convention in Oregon should slap the governor's face. It was an idea that it was of republican origin, and the wonder is that a democratic convention could have been led into such a gross blunder. Regardless of his peculiar views on public questions, Governor Penoyer has a personal following in this state which makes him a power. The fact that he refuses to wear any man's collar makes him a still greater power. Strong individuality coupled with ability and patriotism are forceful elements in political affairs. But, in the desire to carry everything one way, the democratic lost sight of the fact that if Oregon had put forward a candidate in the Chicago convention the state would have leaped into prominence and the Oregon democracy would have wielded an influence in national politics. But it does no good to cry over spilt milk. We only allude to this matter as an illustration of how a body of intelligent and level-headed men can sometimes commit a serious mistake.—Telegram.

This aspersion upon the convention is unjust. There was no disposition on the part of the convention to slap the governor in the face. The fact is that out of the 265 delegates in the convention, the governor had 265 political friends and well-wishers, but candid calls for the statement of the fact, that on the question of what should be the policy of the democratic party in the coming presidential campaign the governor was not in harmony with the sentiment of a large majority of the convention. Had he been, he would have been elected a delegate to the national convention by acclamation. It was creditable to the governor that he remained steadfast to his convictions notwithstanding such steadfastness precluded his election as a delegate. The members of the convention were equally to be commended for their firmness in truly representing their constituents in that convention. It was "bad politics" from first to last to attempt to force the convention to adopt a course entirely at variance with the overwhelming sentiment of the members of the convention and the constituencies they represented, and it is in extremely bad taste for the editor of the Telegram to thus impugn the motives of "a body of intelligent men," or to say that they committed a serious mistake, when he himself was a member of the convention and could not possibly have failed to grasp the fact that every act of the convention was in harmony with the overwhelming democratic sentiment of the state. It is true that the governor wears no man's collar, and this fact reflects great credit upon himself and the people of the great commonwealth of Oregon whose servant he is. But it is equally true that the members of the late state convention also wear no man's collar and this reflects much credit upon the independent manhood of the democratic voters of the state of Oregon. It is folly for the Telegram to kick against the pricks.
