CORVALLIS.—The Corvallis street car company has established a new rate for car fare to those that desire to take advantage of it. Hereafter those who purchase a monthly ticket, can ride as often as they choose during the month for which the ticket is purchased. The price of a monthly ticket is \$1.

THE REASON WHY.—There are always a large number of names on the assessment roll where the indebtedness and exemption equals the gross assessment, leaving no taxes to pay. A peculiar thing occurred this year. The state board of equalization raised the gross assessment 10 per cent, so that all these men will have to pay a tax, no more indebtedness or exemption being taken out; hence a big increase on tax receipts. A new thing also is the ownership book, which contains about a thousand extra names, another cause for more tax receipts. The number of names on the regular assessment roll is only slightly more than last year.

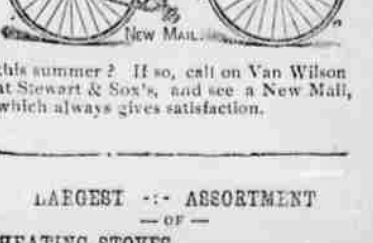
