FORMER LEBANON BOY ARRESTED.—A following dispatch from Seattle taken a sensational case there of great interest to Lin county people. A sensational phase in the Radloff case developed in the arrest of Dr. Frank E. Radloff, of Fremont, a well-known Seattle physician. Radloff is a wealthy relative living in the city. Mrs. Radloff sent for the doctor last night, and made an arrest and later confession, in which she stated that Dr. Radloff was the sole cause of the estrangement between herself and her husband. When her husband learned of the matter, he did not blame the wife. With Konrad, who is now in jail and whose confession gave light to the dark plot entered into for the purpose of defrauding the life insurance companies out of \$55,000, Radloff set to work and arranged the plan of work. He was agreed to force Dr. Radloff into a conspiracy, and partly through fear and partly through a desire to get a share of the money, he consented to become a party to the plot. It was agreed that he should swear that the cadaver found in the burned ruins of Radloff's house was William Radloff's body. This he did, and was also to aid and assist Mrs. Radloff, who was to remain in Seattle, and that she received the \$55,000 from the life insurance companies. For his part he was to receive \$10,000. Dr. Radloff was arrested at 10 o'clock this morning, at 12 o'clock he gave bail in the sum of \$500 and was released from jail.

NEGLECT.—The capital city is a case of neglect to animals that is of interest in Albany, as some of the horses were owned by an Albany man. The Journal says: Saturday night Croisan replenished the half-bred horses of Thos. Holman from the care of Gibson & Colgan. The animals were taken to Minto & Low's stable and are certainly in a pitiful condition. Action will be brought to bring this neglect to justice and if the men charged with the neglect are not made to pay they will be punished. If you have any doubts and want to see what beastly, brutal, inhuman and cruel men can do for a fine animal, go and see John Holman's starved, emaciated mare. The mare has good blood, is young, can go 300, is worth \$200, and had a suckling foal when put in a pasture without feed last fall, and weighed about 10 lbs. The colt, sired by Oneco, died sometime ago and the mare is ready to skin and bones—the hair is nearly all off her skin. When put on sales she barely tipped the beam at \$50, three belonging to Mr. Holman of Albany, who was paying \$15 a month to them pastured and put up each and fed some grain.

McLURE.—Yesterday near Clifton, on the Columbia, a few miles this side of Astoria, the body of a drowned man was found, answering the description, it was reported, of Samuel McLure, a recently disappeared Mr. Walter McLure, a brother, who has been searched for him, was in the city today; but nothing about whether the body was that of his brother. When sent to Portland Samuel McLure had \$500 on his person, and it is quite probable there had been foul play, and the body found was his.

LOW LATE.—On account of the late season there are occasionally long faces. It brings up the question of how spring wheat can be sown and produce a good crop. A pioneer farmer tells a Democrat that he has sown it many times in May with good results, and on occasion saw wheat sown on June 1, that resulted in a fair crop. ASTORIA LETTER.

Astoria, April 23, 1892.

Editors Democrat:

An Albany is interested in Astoria's good fortune, your many readers may be desirous of knowing what is transpiring in being pushed. Now, the fact is, the railroad is being built, not around the hotels and on the corners of the streets, but right along the line. The drivers are driving piles, steamboats are bringing laborers, and tools by the car load, and provisions by the ton; horses and mules by the hundred, and barges of hay and grain to fill them up; of which some of the poor brutes occasionally in need of, having just arrived by rail and boat from the highlands of the Rockies, the last scene of their labors. Engineers are establishing lines and grades. The tunnel is to be tackled from both ends, not only by brute force, but by skilled labor. Electricity, dynamite and other combustibles, both liquid and solid explosive, or non explosive as desired and as the exigencies of the case demands. So you see that even the most obstinate and un-believing skeptic would acknowledge that it looks like something is going to be done, or then "tellers" wouldn't be a "cart" all of them traps down to Astoria. Another evidence of prosperity is the omnipresent real estate dealers. New offices are springing up in every quarter. Everybody talks lots, blocks and acreage. The men about town, the lawyer, doctor, minister, teacher, mechanic or fisherman, all seem touched with a spirit of speculation. Hotels, boarding and lodging houses are crowded. New buildings are being built cheaply and hurriedly. Anybody wanting work can get the chance. The steam boat war has reduced fares and freights so low that few persons can resist the temptation to go or come to Astoria to see for themselves, either for business or pleasure. The Union Pacific boats, it is said, have been withdrawn from the Sound and are coming to the Columbia, no doubt to carry on a war of extermination to other boats. Even the little boats on the lower river have been seized with the contagion, and are cutting rates too, and the new town of Frankfort, across the river in Washington, is profiting by the opportunity to push her claims for some attention from the public, and the visitors to Astoria should not fail to visit a place, which will in a very near future be the principle seaport city of the state of Washington on the lower Columbia and doubtless the terminus of one, if not two, transcontinental railroad lines, the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern. It is only 24 miles to an easy junction with the Chehalis and South Bend road, which will be in operation by September. Now I know the public are not aware of these facts, but these companies know all about it and the importance of the lower Columbia as a harbor. Their engineers have been over all the route and the N. P. owns large bodies of land near, valuable for timber, coal, iron and other minerals, besides its agricultural value which a road and population will develop and make immensely valuable. Rumor has it that the Union Pacific intends building down the river to Astoria. As yet there is nothing definite in the report. It is probable, however, as the distance is short.

O. W. Dunbar is out, pardoned by the governor. Sandy Olds is out of the pen, and the judge that sentenced them will soon be out of office—to stay. The Davins Noris case was overlooked as he couldn't be present in person to call the attention of the grand jury to his unaccountable disappearance.

The centennial celebration of the discovery of the Columbia river by Capt. Robt. Gray on May 11th, 1792, 200 years after Christopher Columbus discovered the eastern shore that marks the confines of Uncle Sam's dominions, is now the all absorbing topic of the Astorian—big and little old and young.
