GOOD EVENING.

LARGE SAN JOSE.—Mr. H. E. Table, writing the DEMOCRAT from San Jose says: "To say that we are delighted with the place does not half express it. We have purchased an acre lot in the Williams addition on Willow street, near Lincoln Avenue, 500 feet from street cars and about two miles from the center of the city, but it is city all the way out and for some distance beyond. Our voting precinct casts over 800 votes, so you see we are not out in the country by any means.
