

"PROTECTION" AND WAGES.

Protectionists profess to believe that a high tariff secures good wages to laborers, and this fact they have maintained was the main reason for adopting protection as a national policy.

There are no illusions among the merchant tailors of this country as to whether the tariff is a tax. In a petition addressed to congress asking to have the number of suits of clothes admitted free of duty limited to two, for returning tourists, the tailors say:

Every one who has bought clothing abroad knows this to be true. And yet the paid ontors of protection of the Roswell G. Har stamp, and dishonest republican newspapers, parade the low prices of American shoddy and sweat-shop clothing as evidence that clothing is as cheap here as it is in England.

Any man of common sense knows that the duty of 49 1/2 cents a pound and 60 per cent of value levied on woollen clothing by the abominable McKinley tariff must change its cost. Our merchant tailors admit that when a returning tourist brings home a suit of clothing without paying duty he "saves more than one-half of its actual value."

Poor people, and even people in moderate circumstances—the great mass of Americans—cannot go abroad for their clothing. And they are compelled by the McKinley act either to wear shoddy or to pay 50 per cent more than its value for honest wool clothing.

This is only one of a thousand wrongs and swindles which the democratic party is bound to correct.—Evanville Courier
