GOOD EVENING

FOR ASSAULT AND BATTERY.—Yesterday Mr. Pattee, working for the Pound Master, Mr. Schmeier, took up a horse belonging to J. S. Griffith, in a lot belonging to Capt. Lansing, in the Third Ward. The matter was attended to and Mr. Griffith had his horse returned to him. This morning Griffith met Pattee near the Postoffice and attacked him, choking him and striking him. Pattee had him arrested and Recorder Henton said \$5 and costs would settle the matter, and the fine was promptly paid.

KILLED BY THE CARS.—This morning just as the noon train started out from Gervais south, it was discovered that an old resident of the place, named Gregoire, was lying on the track, heavily drunk, just ahead of the engine. The engineer had not seen him. A man jumped forward, grabbed him and tried to pull him off the track, but the front wheel passed over one leg at the hip and the other at the ankle. He only lived a short time. Gregoire had lived at Gervais for a good many years, was a Frenchman, and a hard drinker.

BEATS SNIPING.—This morning the practical jokers had a young man running around after some red oil with which to make the red train lights for night use. With a can in hand he went to one or two places, and was finally sent to the round house, where he was told, it was stored. When he got the joke into his head it may be imagined he was somewhat mad. This is equal to holding the snipe bag, running after it in spaces or watching for type lice.

DEDICATION.—On Sunday the new C. P. church in the eastern part of the city was dedicated according to the ceremonial form prescribed by the rules of that church. The little church was filled to overflowing. A very interesting sermon was preached by Rev. Longbottom of Brownsville. The people of that part of the city are fortunate in securing in their midst the establishment of a church whose mission is to assist in bringing up the young in the way they should go and turning the minds of men away from in.

EVANGELICAL ANNUAL CONFERENCE.—The Oregon Conference of the Evangelical association will convene in Portland next week. Bishop Thomas Bowman, of Chicago, Ill., will be present to preside. Since the Bishop has been so grandly vindicated by the last general conference of the church, he is receiving many congratulations, and large congregations are greeting him everywhere. Bishop Bowman will preach in their church in this city Sunday morning May 15. Rev. L. S. Fisher and family will leave for conference Monday morning next.

A BIG DRIVE.—Mr. A. Wheeler, proprietor of the Springfield saw mill, has forty men at work in his logging camp on Fall Creek. They are preparing a drive of two million feet of logs for the Springfield mill and expect to start them down the river in about ten days. They are now rolling the logs into the creek at the rate of about 60,000 feet per day. This is a big drive and will keep the mill going for some time. It has been shut down the past few weeks on account of having no logs to work on.—Review.

THE RADLOFF CASE.—Radloff, the Seattle conspirator, continues to remain at large. He was traced into California, when track of him was lost; but it was thought he returned towards Seattle. His arrest is necessary to the conviction of at least Dr. Ballard. Lebanon people who of course know Dr. Ballard well, say his record there was always clean, and believe the case is one of blackmail. The present aspect is bad though.

LOOKS LIKE BUSINESS.—Two car loads of steel rails for the Albany motor line have arrived, and about eight others will follow. Work on the extension to the Viereck addition will be begun at an early day. The motor car is said to be far ahead of anything else, a noiseless, smokeless affair. The car will carry thirty or forty people and trail two or three cars on extra occasions.

IN FAVOR OF THE COUNTY.—In the suit of Iva Templeton, appellant, against Linn county, respondent, a suit brought for damages on account of a rotten bridge giving way near Crawfordville, the Supreme Court affirmed the decision of the Circuit Court. Lord dissenting.

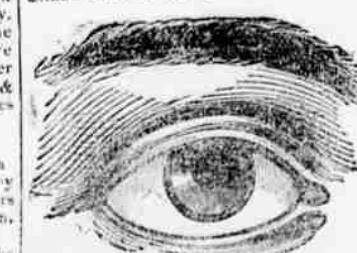

The Portland World publishes a picture of Hon. W. R. Blyden, and says: Among Oregon's distinguished citizens the name of W. R. Blyden stands out in bold relief. A short sketch of his life will be of interest to the World's readers. He was born in Missouri in 1847. Fifteen years later he came across the plains to Oregon, where he has since resided, most of the time in Linn county. He is a graduate of Pacific University, of Forest Grove—that seat of learning which has started many Oregon boys on a career of usefulness and honor. He worked as a mechanic until 26 years of age, since which time he has devoted his talents and energies to the practice of law. In 1878 he was elected to the State Senate to represent the interests of Lane county. So well did he perform his duties that in 1880 he was honored by reelection. Mr. Blyden is the author of the celebrated mortgage tax law, and his efforts are due to its adoption by the Legislature. Despite the fact that capitalists spent thousands of dollars in efforts to defeat its provisions, the supreme court sustained its validity, and it stands today as one of the best laws on the statute books of Oregon. In all matters of public interest Mr. B. is with the people and against monopolies. Being a good Democrat, Mr. B. is for Cleveland and reform. The effort of the democratic state convention to place only good men on the ticket, was happily consummated in the case of W. R. Blyden. He was nominated for Prosecuting Attorney of the Third Judicial District—and he will be elected.
