

BE FAIR.

The Albany Democrat assails the character of Judge Moore, candidate on the republican ticket for supreme judge, in bold headlines and sends us a marked copy. We know nothing about the case cited by the Democrat, but think that Judge Moore's action in breaking a will that defrauded motherless girls of their rightful inheritance is praiseworthy. If the customary one dollar had been given to each of the girls, the will could probably not have been broken. Again was his action praiseworthy by performing the wishes of a stepfather who no doubt was exercising an undue influence over a dying woman, at the same time knowing that the will he was making would not stand a legal test. The case cited seems to be one where "evil was done that good might result." The other side of the story may be different from the Democrat's version.—Scio Press.

The Press attempts to come to the defense of its candidate by mystifying and clouding a matter that is plain and simple. It says: "We know nothing about the case cited by the Democrat, but think that Judge Moore's action in breaking a will that defrauded motherless girls of their rightful inheritance is praiseworthy." But the Press should candidly tell its readers that according to Judge Moore's own sworn words "as they appear in print in appellant's brief in a case tried in the supreme court in 1890 entitled 'T H Taylor vs S A Miller,' He first drew the will himself and then took \$2000 to break it. If it was praiseworthy to break the will it certainly was not praiseworthy to write such a will in the first place. The Press and its readers will see that its defense in this regard is no defense at all. But its own words condemn Moore. The Press speaks of Taylor being a stepfather, but there was no stepfather in the case to exercise an undue influence over a dying woman. Moore himself refutes the idea of the Press that he wrote the will in the way he did knowing that it would not stand the test. The reason the will was invalid was because the names of the three girls were omitted entirely and Moore says under oath that in drawing the will he never thought of them. The facts as they appear in his own evidence in the brief above referred to are as follows: Moore wrote the will for Mrs. Taylor. Mr. Taylor and two of the daughters were in the house at the time of the execution of the will. Mrs. Taylor gave him "no directions whatever" as to "how she wanted the will drawn," but the "only information" he "had as to the manner the will should be drawn in was that given him by Taylor himself and that was to give it all to him. He read the will to Mrs. Taylor after its completion and asked her if that was her will, and he says he 'understood her to say yes; it was in a low, gasping tone.' He said the only 'definite reason' that he had for not signing the will as a witness was that he 'thought at the time the woman was not conscious of what she was doing.' Moore after the death of Mrs. Taylor (which occurred about two hours after writing the will) drew up the papers and had the will admitted to probate and did not then discover that the names of the heirs had been omitted. But some time after this he did discover through his clerk that the will was invalid. He was the first to tell the girls that the will was void. He made an agreement with them 'to try the question of the validity of this will and the title to the East Portland property in consideration of the payment to us by them of a thousand dollars should we win the case.' He and his partner sold one daughter's share to one Foster and the other two shares to themselves. They sold it for \$2000 and received \$1000 for their services. The evidence showed the property to be worth from \$11,000 to \$15,000. These are the cold, stern, facts and Moore has not denied them.

The republican papers are already showing that they expect the Eastern Oregon sheep to vote and elect their men. But the sheep are not voting this year. Their owners have mostly gotten the wool out of their teeth. They have discovered that a high wool tariff does not benefit them, but rather injures them. No, the sheep won't vote much this year.—Telegram

His opponent, on the other hand, Judge A S Bennett, is an able and popular lawyer, known throughout the district as a gentleman of honor and integrity and would wear the ermine with dignity and becoming alike to himself and to the high station for which he is named. There is certainly no politics in the election of a supreme judge, and quite as certainly there is no need to select a person wholly unfit for the place.—Mercury.

W R Blyeu, the democratic candidate for prosecuting attorney, in the third judicial district, is one of the ablest and best known attorneys in the state of Oregon, and the people are to be congratulated upon his candidacy. He is a fluent speaker, a keen reasoner, and in every way is peculiarly fitted for the office to which he aspires.
