GOOD EVENING

INDEPENDENCE IS READY.—This item of base ball news is from the Independence West Side: "For several days there has been a movement on foot looking to the organization of a first class base ball club in this city, the idea being to join the valley league. The plan is the organization of a limited liability joint stock company, with a capital stock of \$10,000 divided into 100 shares of \$100 each. Almost all of this stock has been taken, and the success of the undertaking is now assured. Four cities, Salem, Albany, McMinnville and Independence, will comprise the membership, and all will have professional players. The schedule will be made up so that about thirty games will be played in each city, three games each alternate week. Playing will begin early this month, as soon as possible after the meeting in Salem in a few days, to select officers and complete the organization of the valley league." This leaves only McMinnville to be heard from.

A BANK DEFAULTER.—It is currently reported in banking circles here that Harry Talbot Hawson, assistant cashier of the Arlington National bank, is a defaulter to the extent of \$25,000. About three weeks since Hawson severed his connection with the bank, ostensibly on account of ill health, and left Arlington for the alleged purpose of coming to Portland for hospital treatment. He has not been seen in this city. Shortly after Hawson's departure his accounts were checked over, and it is claimed the books showed a shortage of the amount above stated. The Oregon National bank of this city is correspondent for the Arlington bank. D. F. Sherman, cashier of the former, said Hawson had left the bank, but that he does not credit the story of the default. This is the bank in which Wm. Ralston, of this city, is interested.

EXAMINATION TODAY.—Dr. Ballard was to be examined this afternoon in Seattle in the Radloff case, which is the principal theme in that city. The Telegram says: "Rostrom thinks the police are not likely to capture Radloff anywhere soon, as the fugitive was pretty well provided with ready cash. The amount Radloff had in his possession at the time he left here, Rostrom says, was between \$400 and \$500. Rostrom says he will make some startling disclosures after he has been sentenced for the crimes to which he purports pleading guilty in the superior court, and declares that what he has to say will be extremely interesting. He recalled yesterday that on Friday he passed his twenty-first birthday, and expressed the regret that it was spent in prison. Rostrom reiterates his former assertion that Radloff, if captured, will never be taken alive."

If railroad rumors are to be relied upon, we may believe that during the coming summer a branch of the Southern Pacific railroad will be built from Springfield along the old Military road, entering Eastern Oregon in the vicinity of Crescent lake.—Review and News.

ALBANY TO ASTORIA.—Albany will probably have an opportunity to say whether she wants a railroad from Astoria or not. While we are watching Eugene raise a \$100,000 subsidy we must begin getting ready for some live work on our own part. Representatives of the Astoria road coming this way will be at Salem and Albany in a few days to see what the cities will do. The road is one the city wants, and there should be at the proper time a strong effort made to secure it.

CARMAN FINED.—Frank Carman, the man from Lebanon, who is supposed to be a desperate man of some sort, was arraigned before City Recorder Goodell yesterday to answer a charge of carrying concealed weapons. He pleaded guilty and was sentenced to thirty days in the county jail. It is said that when that sentence shall have expired he will be taken to Linn county to answer a charge of forging a note for \$25.00 on two men of that county.—Statesman.

THE O. P. CASE.

The Telegram says: Today the case of Lindley Smyth et al against T. Eugene Hogg et al was being argued before Judge Deady in the United States circuit court. This argument is on motion to show cause why a restraining injunction should not be granted to prevent Job, as purchaser of the Oregon Pacific railroad at the foreclosure sale, from transferring the property to any other company that may be organized contrary to the terms of the agreement between the bondholders of the present company. The plaintiff claims that Hogg assented to that agreement and deposited his bonds under it, and that he now threatens to procure Job to convey the property in another direction.

Hogg denies that he ever made any such threat and claims that, while he was not a party to the bondholders agreement, yet he desires to carry it into effect, and alleges the truth to be that Job bid \$1,000,000 at the foreclosure sale, which has to be raised in money to pay off the receivers' certificates and other indebtedness made by the decree a priori lien upon the property superior to the lien of bond, and that the bondholders in their agreement fail to make any arrangement for the procurement of the \$1,000,000 except by sale of the bonds of the new company after it shall have been organized and its bonds issued; whereas, under the decree, the \$1,000,000 must be paid in immediately.

The issue that is being argued is whether or not an injunction shall be issued.

E. C. Brownough and Paul R. Deady appear for the defendants, and John P. Fay and Judge Calkins for the plaintiff. The case will be taken under advisement by the court.
