

GOOD EVENING

JUSTICES AND CONSTABLES.—The following nominations for Justices of the Peace and Constables have been filed with the County Clerk: Jas P. Quenier, for Justice by People's party, for district around Lyons; R M Bradley for Justice at Brownville, by democrats; W J Wiggins, for Justice of dist 3, by Peoples party, and A P Hiron, for Constable; C H Dahlgren, for Justice of dist 1, L M Carl, democrat, and A B Woodin, republican, for Justice of district 2; J S Ireland, Peoples party, for Justice; and J R Pond, democrat, for Constable of district 9; W J Stewart, republican, for Justice; and F J Gray for Constable at Halsey; T J McClary, Peoples party, dist.—The first contest is promised at Lebanon, where there is considerable feeling in the matter. F M Miller and Fred Brown are each on the list as the regular nominees of the republicans for Justice, A G Williams for Constable. The democrats have nominated C A Elson for Justice and D D Shaw for Constable.

NO COMPARISON AT ALL.—In its account of the Democratic City Convention held in McMinnville the Telephone-Register gives Hon W R Bilyeu, nominee for district attorney, the following notice, which people who saw Mc Cain in Albany on his visit here will readily appreciate: After Judge Shaw had finished, Mr Bilyeu addressed the convention. Mr Bilyeu was a resident of this county in his youth, his parents having settled in the Chehalis valley. He is an eloquent talker and is considered to be one of the best campaign orators in the state. No comparison can be made between the abilities of Mr Bilyeu and Mr McCain. Mr Bilyeu has the power to address a jury and hold their undivided attention, while Mr McCain talks to them and then cannot find words to properly express his thoughts. Noting the personal appearance of Mr Bilyeu and Mr McCain it does not take long to arrive at a conclusion concerning their talents. No marks of dissimulation near the intelligent features of Mr Bilyeu.

A SERIOUS RUNAWAY.—On May 4th about one o'clock p. m., Mrs C M Skeels and her daughter Mary, who is about 15 years old, started to Jefferson in a cart; when they were near the blacksmith shop the horse became frightened at the south bound freight train and ran away with them, running about 40 rods, crossed the railroad and just after crossing it the cart struck a chunk of wood, throwing them both out with great force against a pile of wood. This horse immediately after the ladies were thrown out the cart and was caught four or five miles south of Jefferson. Dr Hawk, of Jefferson, was sent for and found Mary's shoulder dislocated and the collar broken, also that some of the small bones of Mrs Skeels' wrist were broken.—Journal.

SERIOUSLY BURNED.—J A Dobkin, while at work in the Lebanon Machine Shop, met with a serious accident last Friday which may result in the loss of one or both eyes. He was pouring molten rabbit metal into a boxing which had been lined with paper saturated with mucilage, when an explosion occurred, blowing the heated metal into his eyes. Dr Courtney was immediately called and removed the metal from his eyes, which, however, had so badly burned one of the organs that a portion of the lid dropped off. Mr Dobkin is doing as well as could be expected. Dr Courtney informs us that he will be able to save both eyes.—Advocate.

THE NORTH END.—Yesterday afternoon the members of the city council had a conference with residents of Benton county across the river, as to the best territory for the bridge, and it was decided to make it on the road running past Penecocks and Phillips, near the letter. This will necessitate the building of 600 or 600 feet of trestle. Benton county will be petitioned to assist in constructing the same. The present outlook is that the bridge will be completed before teams can get on it with ease.

NOT E. R. LUCKEY.—The Guard says that whatever mystery remains about the disappearance of E R Luckey is not further solved by advices received from California regarding the man supposed to be Luckey, and who was committed to the Stockton asylum. This morning Marshal Eastland received a letter from the Sheriff of Yuba county, which shows that the man in the asylum was not the Eugene Luckey at all, which makes the case still more mysterious.

A HOUSE BURNED.—About 1 o'clock this morning the fire bell rang. The cause was the burning of a vacant building owned by Mrs V B Winn, several blocks east of the O P depot. It was entirely consumed. The building was old and unoccupied. Loss about \$500. No insurance. It was probably of incendiary origin.

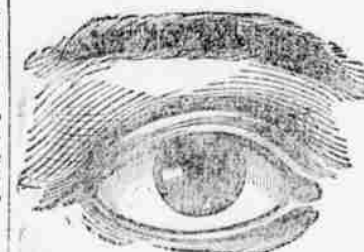

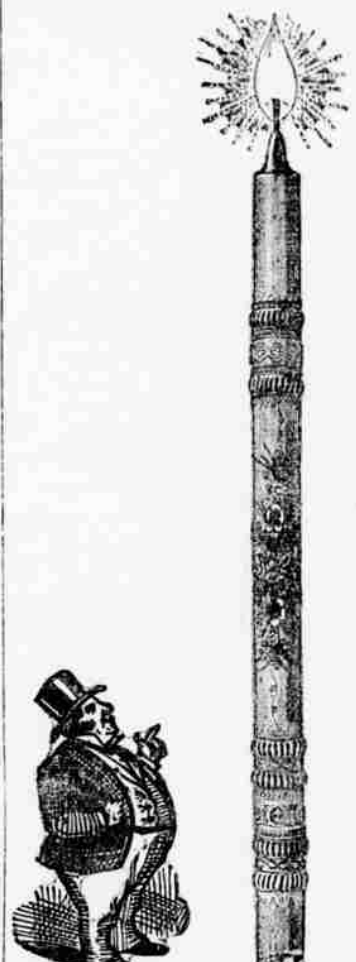
