ALBANY ELECTION.—Among the latest elections was the one in Harrisburg. Two or three mixed tickets were fielded. E. E. Upmeyer was elected receiving 84; Dr. E. DuGlas, 10; E. J. Smith, 9. John McDaniel was elected marshal; G. W. Iam, recorder; E. Smith, treasurer; L. H. Lasalle, clerk. W. W. Carter, D. C. Holt, C. Morris and Al Valentine councilmen.

ALBANY ELECTION.—At Lebanon today only one ticket was in the race. C. H. Ralston was elected mayor, receiving 141 votes; for councilman, J. C. Smith, 150; G. M. Westfall, 108; G. W. Rice, 113; E. J. Kellenberger, 154; for recorder, G. W. Rice received 159; J. A. Smith, 166 for treasurer; S. C. Mackey, for marshal. The other candidates were Biram Baker and D. B. Zeb who received 50, Bud Thompson received 78.
