### TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

**Public Buildings.**  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—Estimates prepared by the treasury department and sent to congress today include appropriations for public buildings as follows: Portland, Or., to complete..... \$250,000  
St. Paul, Minn., to continue..... 700,000  
Sioux Falls, S. D., to complete..... 350,000

**Didn't Excite Them.**  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—In the senate, so soon as the secretary finished reading the journal, a messenger handed him the president's message, which he proceeded to read. The commercial and business statistics given in the first part of the message and the sarcastic paragraphs as to the supposed effect of a tariff for revenue seemed to meet general approval on the republican side of the chamber. They attracted but little attention on the other side. During the reading the democratic senators for the most part were chatting listlessly with each other or attending to their correspondence.

**Cheep Rates.**  
SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 6.—T. H. Goodman, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific Company, who has just returned from a conference of passenger officials at Chicago, says that while nothing definite was decided upon at the conference about the fare to the Chicago world's fair, it was certain that the round trip from here would be \$70, which is the present single fare.

**A Print Shop Burned.**  
PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 6.—The Public Ledger building was almost gutted by fire this evening. The damage was confined almost entirely to the composing room, but a torrent of water flooded every floor in the structure. The loss can only be approximated, but will probably be between \$250,000 and \$300,000; the insurance is \$100,000. The cause of the fire is unknown.

**A Peculiar Compromise.**  
WALLA WALLA, Wash., Dec. 6.—The contest case which J. J. Huffman proposed to enter today to test W. B. Hawley from the auditorship was not entered. This morning Huffman and Hawley met and agreed upon a compromise. The terms of the agreement are that Hawley shall hold the office for the first year and employ Huffman as first deputy. At the end of the first year Hawley is to resign in favor of Mr. Huffman and will be employed by the latter as first deputy.

**Rosecrans III.**  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—At 11 o'clock tonight there was no material change in General Rosecrans' condition. He is very weak, but is able to partake of his usual amount of nourishment.
