

GOOD EVENING

A VERY BAD GIRL.—The girl mentioned in the following from the Oregonian is a Eugene and not an Albany girl, as stated, though she was recently arrested in Albany, and hence the case is of interest here. Lulu Dodson, the 15 year old girl who ran away from the Refuge Home a few weeks ago and was captured in Whitechapel by Officer John McKernan, of the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society, Saturday, taken from the city jail yesterday and placed in the Magdalen asylum on the West Side. There was no hope of converting her in the Refuge Home. She informed the officers that it was her intention to be as bad as possible. She wanted to make her home in one of the houses in Whitechapel and proposed to do so as soon as she became of age. She rejects all attempts to induce her to return. She will not go to school and is giving her custodians as much trouble as possible. Lulu is a remarkably good girl for her age, giving the appearance of being at least 20 years old. She has pleasing features that have been somewhat marred by excessive disfigurement. The girl's home is at Albany, where a companion was convicted of stealing and damaging property belonging to neighbors.

CRICK COUNTY.—The heavy rains of the past week seem to have been quite general except on the uplands. They are now there. However it is not deep in this is a model December so far. The rains are said to be very heavy. During the present week Wallace Post, Newsom creek, was arrested and taken before U. S. Commissioner Douthett on examination on a charge of perjury, sworn by Benjamin Taylor, of the locality. The case grew out of the "sinking" of a part of Taylor's land claim, and the perjury is alleged to have been committed at the time when Post signed his homestead affidavit, he having taken residence on the land while the case in fact was by a member of his family. He was held in the sum of \$500 by the U. S. grand jury. Bonds were furnished. —News.

OREGON VICTORY.—The Salem Journal is a little mixed in the following; but means well, probably simply having a location of tangent wrong: The Oregon railroad commission has scored an victory for the people by inducing D. P. Railway Co. to give the town a station house. This they had needed, but were never able to get until they prosecuted their case against the railroad commission. The commission investigated the demands of the town and finding them just, reduced the officials of the corporation to the facilities required. The commission will now build a \$3000 depot and station there.

TWO PARDONS.—Clinton Pennington, released from Baker county to serve a term in the Oregon penitentiary, was released Tuesday by Governor Penney, on recommendation of three physicians, Pennington is dying from consumption. He was sentenced to hang, but the governor commuted it to life imprisonment. He has been in prison nearly two years. Full pardon was given John Davidson, who was sentenced from Portland for cheating money under false pretenses, and was last January to serve three years. The urgent needs of his family was the reason for the pardon.

GOOD CLAIM.—Last July Thos J. Jones made the discovery that twenty acres in the heart of M. L. Jones' big farm, Brooks was vacant—that is, although Jones had been in peaceful possession for years the land office records at Oregon City showed the land to be vacant. The title to it was still vested in the government. And forthwith after making this discovery Mr. Arthur proceeded to test the tract, which is very valuable, having been in cultivation many years and being a part of what Mr. Jones has always supposed was his farm. —Salem.

P. track for the purpose of wrecking the overland, but fortunately was discovered by the track walker before it could be put in place. It was evidently the work of tramps who have a grudge against the road or some of the employees.

The directors of the Panama Railroad Company have definitely decided to inaugurate a line of steamers between New York and San Francisco, via Panama. Under the old service, which has heretofore been performed by the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, owing the fact that the Pacific Mail steamers at the Isthmus have not made close connections, it has taken forty to forty-five days to ship goods to New York from San Francisco, and vice versa. Under the new arrangement it is proposed to make quick connections, and most of the steamers will not stop at Central American points. Assurance is given that goods will be landed in New York from San Francisco in thirty days time, or, in other words, only ten or twelve days longer than the present all-rail shipments. It is proposed to dispatch three steamers a month. This arrangement is going to revolutionize the transportation business of this coast, say shippers, and it seems to be the only speedy solution of the transportation problem.
