In Answer.

Editor Democrat:

I desire to make answer to an article
that appeared in a little Sunday sheet
called "The Telescope," wherein the man-
agement of the City Fire Department was
unjustly attacked. As for Albany Engine
Co. No. 1 having no coke at this time, it
may have been true, but if so there is no
excuse for it as Linn Engine Co. No. 2 had
a good supply which could have been
easily borrowed, and such has been the
custom in times past under such circum-
stances. The coke that had been sent for
had miscarried and arrived the day of the
fire. Such accidents in shipping have
happened and may happen any one. That
there has been no fire in No. 1 company's
heater for three weeks is as false as the
added brain that conceived it, as is the
statement that it was fifteen minutes be-
fore water could be thrown from the hose
after the alarm was turned in. There was
no necessity of throwing water at this
particular time and all that was thrown
was for the simple purpose of testing the
engine. If Engineer Lee made the state-
ment that is attributed to him, then he
burdens himself with the responsibility
that may have followed any accident, as if
it is his duty to notify the proper officers of
the company that his engine is out of coke.
No the article mentioned seeks to injure
the Fire Department and cast reflection
on its managing officers. But it is a fact
well known that the department is now in
better shape to render effective service
it an ever before. That there are no com-
mission hold downs for material, etc.,
furnished the department under Chief
Wyatt's administration, and this coupled
with the fact that a certain job office was
refused certain pricing for the depart-
ment, for reasons too well known for dis-
cussion, is no doubt the chief cause of this
attack.

THE YOUNGEST HON.—Hon. C. K. Wil-
kinson, member-elect of the state legisla-
ture from Lane county, and the young-
est member of that body, is in the city.
Mr Wilkinson is but a few months past
21 years of age, and at the time of his
nomination had just attained his majority.
He was born at Mineral Point, Iowa
county, Wis., in May, 1871, and came to
this state in 1885, settling with his parents
in Eugene, where he has resided for the
past seven years. Of the three candidates
elected to the legislature two were repub-
licans, b. majorities of about 350, while
Mr Wilkinson received nearly 100 more
votes than any other candidate on either
of the tickets. He is the youngest man
ever elected to the legislature of Oregon.
