The Oregonian, for the first time in a long while, is engaged in writing "crisp" articles.

Whether at the poles or at the equator, the world's people are really traveling around the sun with the earth itself at the rate of about 65,000 miles an hour. The earth's motion is one of comparatively slow rotation, yet of swift progression on its orbit.

The republicans in Kansas and Nebraska are straining every nerve to cheat the populists out of two United States senators to which they are clearly entitled. The populists may depend upon it that the democrats will come to their aid when republicans attempt to force stolen senators into seats in the United States senate.

As the tariff question is yet an unsettled problem we deem it pertinent to call attention to the fact that during the late campaign we were told by republicans that the tin plate manufacturing industry had so far advanced that the markets were largely supplied with the home product. If this be so, why was it necessary to import during the month of October 1892, 43,158,075 pounds of tin plate against only 20,054,856 pounds for the month of October 1891?

Already a large number of manufactories that shut down after the election, to score the country into the idea that Democracy was hostile to industrial pursuits, have resumed work—in fact, all of them have. The closing down was simply an exhibition of the same kind of petulance that a child shows who refuses to play when it can't have everything its own way. Democracy is not the enemy of industry and prosperity, but the steadfast friend and promoter of both. Under the policy of a tariff for revenue only we shall have our ships back upon the seas where our fathers placed them, and our markets enlarged to the utmost limits of the earth. With the enlargement of our markets will come increased demands for our products, which will create an increased demand for labor. Free trade is the natural principle of commerce, and to interfere with it is to place restriction upon its utmost possibilities. The Chinese wall, as poor Tom Reed boasting calls the tariff, shuts out more prosperity than it shut in. The people found it out and tore down the hindrance at the November polls.—Ex.

There are two extremes in President Harrison's message which when placed upon an even footing show his deductions to be untenable to that extent as to be ridiculous. These are, the advocacy of a subsidy for the purpose of developing an American merchant marine. Taking the republican definition of a protective tariff it is for the purpose of developing manufacture so as to supply the home demand and create a market whose consumptive capacity will demand the home supply. Thus to put the republican policy of protection into effect—granting that a protective tariff would accomplish all that republicans claim it will—we would need no merchant marine as the scene of production would be the scene of consumption. In other words we would neither export nor import. Thus it will be seen that we cannot have high protective tariff laws in effect and at the same time develop a merchant marine, nor can we with the hope of making it remunerative have an efficient merchant marine service under high protection. These are diametrical and one can only exist at the expense of the non-existence of the other. To make our merchant marine profitable we would have to develop our import and export trade, which is just the reverse of what the republicans claim for high protection. Mr. Harrison strikes an unpopular string when he advocates further voting of subsidies, even if his proposition were logical. The development of enterprise in the future, at least so long as the democracy is in power, must be by natural conditions, with subsidy as the most remote contingency. Common sense does not teach that any people shall tax themselves excessively to develop an industry or an enterprise in opposition to the fixed laws of nature. The best and surest way, and the only equitable way, to develop a merchant marine is to amend our shipping laws and wipe out class legislation to the end that we may have an unrestricted commerce. Give us an unrestricted commerce so that vessels can command freight both ways, going and coming, and the merchant marine service will develop without a subsidy.—Council Bluffs Globe.
