AN OPERATION PERFORMED.—Readers of the Times are familiar with the circumstances of a frightful accident last summer, caused by an O. P. special running into a hand car on which were eleven persons. In this accident Mr. L. M. Manning, well known in this city, suffered a fracture of one leg below the knee, from the effects of which he has been a lame man ever since. The fractured bones having permanently refused to knit together, a recent letter to Mr. Virgil Waters, our efficient county recorder, from Dr. Bushnell, formerly of Newport, but now of San Francisco, states that on the 16th of December an operation was performed on Mr. Manning that promises to affect a permanent cure. An incision was made along the fractured bones, and they were fixed together in such a manner as will compel them to knit.—Corvallis Times.

A FORMER ALBANY FIRM.—Monteith Sellenbach, of Spokane Falls, have the DEMOCRAT thanks for a fine copy of the Spokane Review, of Jan 1st. A big half size ad. of that firm, illustrated with pictures and their different scores, signifying at Albany, tells of their progress and success there, as follows: Albany, Or., 1880 to 1887, business per year, \$40,000. Too High Taxes.—Lane county people are greatly agitated over a 25 mill tax, the grange particularly wants it lowered to 20 mills. The court though declares mills to be necessary and will let it stand. One of the speakers before the court in favor of a lower tax was Rev. J. D. Ivler. The Guard says he made quite a speech. He said that the court house was worse than a barn, while the jail was a fine building in the county. He said that a jail should be something of orator to terrify criminals. He said a man with brains after seeing the Idahoone jail and poor court house, with a tax of 25 mills, would not invest here, said that everything was low, and the people were unable to pay such a tax, before he was in favor of a 20 mill tax.

IN HAY'S CASE.—A Salem paper says, a state board of railroad commissioners receipt of a letter from Jerry Hay, of Albany, thanking the members for efforts to bring about a settlement of claims against the Southern Pacific damages on account of injuries sustained by his son Frank, who was run over at Harrisburg. County Commissioner Anderson, of this county, has informed the board that Mr. Koehler's statement to the effect that the Southern Pacific satisfactorily arranged cattle guard fences on his place, was not wholly true, and asked the board not to dismiss complaint until the matter is adjusted.

OLD BUT FRESH.—The Woodburn Independent tells the following: R. C. Chishman, who lives near Mt. Angel, has, in his killing of a turkey in its craw a nugget of pure gold worth at least \$100. In the craw of two other turkeys he got several other and smaller nuggets. In hunting around over the place he picked up small pieces of gold to the value of at least \$10. Most of this came from the hillside, but one or two pieces is from the creek. Lemuel Walker has gone to prospect the place and see what is there. He states that the gold very much resembles that found in the river. This is not a "fake" but a matter of fact.

LOST IN THE SNOW.—The following from the Corvallis Times reads peculiarly from a valley paper: Mr. James Denman, a bricklayer of this city, met with an experience in the late snow storm that he will not speedily forget. He had been building some flues at the farm of Mr. Wallis Nash seven miles distant from Nashville, and started about 10 o'clock one morning from the latter place on his way to his home in Corvallis. He was loaded with tools, the snow was three feet deep, and his progress was very slow. The middle of the afternoon found him struggling along, about exhausted and apparently by no means near his destination. It soon dawned upon him however, that he had lost his way, and in order that better progress might be made he dropped his tools. He continued his weary tramp until nightfall, when from sheer exhaustion he gave up the search, and crawling under some vine maple boughs that afforded slight shelter, made himself as comfortable as his desperate circumstances would permit. Dawn the next morning found him stiff, benumbed and hungry, but he pushed on, and finally reached Nashville in time to catch the train for Corvallis. Mr. Denman, who on this occasion was without food 48 hours, has recovered fully from the effects of his night in the snow.

AFTER MANY YEARS.—O. F. Canfield, a stockman and mine owner of Idaho, arrived in the city last night from Grangeville, Idaho, enroute to California to visit his father. Forty five years ago Mr. Canfield was a resident of Polk county—when Oregon City was the metropolis and seat of government of the state, when there were only four or five houses in Portland and when Salem was practically out of sight—and his mission here is to visit his old friend Hon. J. A. Baker, with whom he crossed the plains in '47. He came down to the Willamette valley from Idaho in the interests of the Hudson Bay Co., just after the Whitman massacre and resided in Polk County until fifteen years ago, when he returned to Idaho. Mr. Canfield is quite partial toward the Hudson Bay Co. and says its people were the most hospitable and generous of any then in Oregon. More aid came from General McLaughlin, he says, than from any other source.—Statesman.
