The Populists Meet!

OREGON CITY, Jan. 6.—The state central
committee of the people's party closed its
session about 2 o'clock in the morning.
Every conceivable subject received the
attention of the committee and resolutions
bearing upon convict labor, exemption of
indebtedness, mortgages, manual training
in connection with the public schools,
establishment of a great daily populist
paper somewhere in the center of the union
and any number of other schemes were
adopted as measures to be pushed by the
party during the next session of the legis-
lature. The members elected to the legis-
lature by the populists were present and
said they would do all they can to carry out
the decision of the party organization on
these measures.

The Royalists!

MADRID, Jan. 6.—The Count of Paris has
gone to Seville with his son, Ferdinand
Francis, aged 11 years, and Count d'Haus-
sionville, formerly manager of the count's
press bureau for spreading royalist opin-
ions. The Count of Paris will, it is
expected, be soon joined by the countess
and the rest of the family, and a gathering
of the Orleanist princes and their principal
counselors will take place to fix a line of
conduct in view of the French general
elections. The Spanish government is
keeping an espionage upon the count and
his adherents.

Wants to Be a Senator.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 6.—In reference
to the report that there was a probability
of his appointment to a position in the
cabinet of President Cleveland, W. W. Foote
said:
"If there is any such disposition on the
part of the president I have not heard of
it, and I could scarcely say whether or not
I could accept such appointment. I have
ambition for only one position, and that is
United States senator, which I regard as
the highest office in the gift of the people."

The Chinese Bill.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—Senator Dolph
said today that he did not think it was
likely that the Chinese in his state would
be able to defeat the operation of the so-
called Geary bill, but there was a question
whether congress would make sufficient
appropriations to carry the law into effect,
and remove the Chinese from this country.
Mr. Dolph does not believe the law will
be enforced.
