

WANT A POSTPONEMENT.—The O. P. sale is advertised for the 6th instant. An application has been made for a postponement until the 7th of March. It is doubted if Judge Fullerton grants it, at least without a remarkably strong showing. The general opinion is that there have been too many postponements already. In reference to the matter the Corvallis Times says: Developments here indicate that the bondholders are endeavoring to carry out the plan of examining the road by the bondholders, and levying an assessment in order to have it. Papers have already been served on L. Flinn, attorney of the Oregon Pacific, giving notice that application will be made in the circuit court tomorrow asking for a postponement of the sale of the road until March 7th. The application is made by the Farmers' Trust and Loan Co., acting for the bondholders, and will say that the additional time is required in order that an expert may be sent over the road to examine and report on its value. The denouement is waited with interest.

STATE LEGISLATURE.

Governor Penoyer's message was not a very savage affair after all, nothing remarkably startling characterizing it. He reviews the different departments and state institutions, advised retrenchment and reform by doing away with the Railroad and fish commissions, board of horticulture, domestic animal and food commissions, and recommends the following:

1. A change in the assessment law.
2. The abolition of useless commissions.
3. A law fixing maximum rates for railroad and telegraph companies.
4. A law empowering municipalities to fix maximum rates on all monopolies.
5. A law authorizing the Governor to employ a prosecuting witness.
6. A law giving to all State and county officers a fixed salary.
7. A general municipal incorporation law.
8. A change in the road laws so as to secure good roads.
9. Providing for the arrest and punishment of armed men in private employ.
10. The passage of an inheritance tax law.
11. The enactment of a law similar to that of Washington, exempting homesteads from execution and attachment.
12. Authority to the School Land Commissioners to withhold from any county its school fund until all the state taxes from said county have been received.
13. The creation of a State Auditing Board.
14. No further illegal appropriation of money by joint resolution.
15. Appropriation for a fish ladder at Oregon City.
16. A change in the law relating to the conveyance of criminals and insane persons.
17. Instructions to our Representatives in Congress to procure appropriation for a portage road at The Dalles of the Columbia; to secure the passage of a joint resolution allowing Oregon to use the interest on the Agricultural College Funds for betterments on the college property; to secure an extension of time in which payment may be made by settlers for lands within the forfeited limits; to vote for the free coinage of silver; the issuance of the paper money of the country by the Government alone, and the enactment of an income tax law.

In the house each member was allowed 200 two cent stamps and 100 one cent wrappers. A committee was appointed to visit the locks at The Dalles and mouth of Columbia, and state institutions, and books of officers. Calendar clerk ordered at \$8 per day. Democratic members voted for \$5 per day. A resolution by Upton provided that only Union labor cigars and tobacco be smoked.

Referred. Miller, of Linn, introduced resolution providing for election of senator by the people. Special order for Monday, Jan 16. Foreign immigration joint memorial adopted. Memorial that World's fair be not closed on Sunday adopted. Senate resolution to extend time for forfeit of railroad lands by congress to Jan, 1894, adopted.

By Ready, for a jute factory, and two bills to amend the code; Miller, for an Oregon City fishway; Northrup, for a free bridge at Portland; Belknap, amending the election, county and assessment laws; Brown, of Douglas, amending fish laws; Curran, for macadam roads; Ormsby, amending the assessment law; Miller, incorporating Lebanon; amending the code and for a public soda spring at Sodaville; Sheridan, amending the game law, and to protect Mongolian pheasants; Belts, amending the game laws, defining trespass, and for courts of arbitration; Ford, exempting \$600 of household property; Mays, protecting stock owners; Nickell, protecting Mongolian pheasants, amending the code, and for recording will; Maloney, amending the assessment law; Bishop, amending the marriage law, and the code; Northrup, for relief of indigent soldiers; Da'ey, for the relief of Lake county, and exempting homesteads from execution; Ormsby,

regulating hours of labor on street railway lines, and amending the election law; Myers, on sea lions; Merritt, on wire fences, and amending game law, and numerous city charter laws and amendments to code.

In the senate usual examining committees were appointed. Codes ordered purchased for members and customary orders for stamps, etc. Among the bills introduced were, by Denny, providing for two additional circuit judges in the 4th judicial district; by Blackman, asking for \$5,000 for bridge across north fork of John Day river; by Meyers, to regulate road supervisors; by Cogswell, to regulate late branding of cattle; by McGinn, authorizing the city of Portland to acquire two free bridges; by Meyers, protecting laborers under a receiver.

Cross introduced a bill for a board of examiners of steam engines.

House resolution to appoint a joint committee of five to prepare joint memorials to congress on foreign immigration; praying for the early completion of Nicaragua canal, and the opening of the World's fair on Sunday, were concurred in.

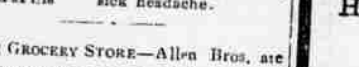
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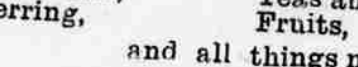
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
