STATE LEGISLATURE.

A cyclone of bills have been rushed before the legislators. We give a list of some of them.

IN THE HOUSE.

Coon regulating sale of nursery stock; creating office of inspector of fruit pests; by Baughman, creating the county of Mineral, now part of Lane; Ford, by request, to create office of examiner of stationary and portable engines; Miller, to create state mining bureau; Duncan, assessment law; Brown of Douglas, to encourage use wide tires for wagons; Northup, to prevent sale of unwholesome food for medicine; Nickell, to amend county publishing law; to amend game law as to deer, to provide for levy of a hospital tax of \$1.00 per capita; Cooper, fixing legal rate of interest at 6 per cent, on contract 8 per cent; Blevens, assessor law; Miller, of Linn, for state series of school text books, to be compiled by state board of education, to be printed and bound by state sold by state treasurer at cost appropriate \$25,000.

A communication was received from the Portland chamber of commerce asking the repeal of the mortgage tax law.

Cooper, to exempt homesteads from execution; Geer of Clackamas, to prevent stock running at large in certain cases, and to amend the general laws relating to railroad commissioners and providing for their election by the people; Houck, to punish the placing of obstructions on car track; Sheridan, to make railroads liable for damage to employees; Ford, notice of bills for precinct assessors, county prosecuting attorneys and to acquire all public supplies to be bid upon.

IN THE SENATE.

By Denny, to prevent a person with fire arms from trespassing upon enclosed lands; by Bancroft, to regulate the assessment laws; Looze, to regulate hunting on enclosed lands; by Matlock, to create a commission to represent Oregon at the World's fair, to consist of six persons; by Bancroft, to define and punish for obstructing the railway track; by Meyers, to provide for the filing of chattel mortgages within five days after execution; by Cross, prescribing fees of assessor; by Blackman, regulating the amount to be paid upon an insurance policy, the face of the policy to be the legal amount to collect; by Cameron, to establish a mining bureau, and to create the office of state geologist and mineralogist; by Weatherford, to exempt homesteads from execution; by Cross, to appropriate money for State Agricultural college; by Denny, to provide for the commitment of persons using narcotics to excess to the asylum; by Kaley, to create the office of recorder in the county of Umatilla; Cameron, governing payment of county warrants; by Hamilton, to punish persons for pointing fire arms at any person; by Cross, regulating court clerk's compensation.

By Cross, regulating road supervisors, Butler, for addition to the Monmouth state normal school; Kaley, for a portage railway above the Dalles; Huston for the assessment of dogs; Bancroft, for the benefit of education, and for the protection of railroad cars against burglars.

OBITUARY.

Mr Jesse Barr, died at his home 3 miles west of Sweet Home, at the age of 74 years, 2 months and 16 days. Jesse Barr was born in Davis county, Tennessee, October 18th, 1818, and grew to manhood there, and then moved with his parents to Green county, Illinois; then to Missouri, where he was married to Miss Anna Kirk, in Mercer county, January 5th, 1843. Moved with his wife and three children to Wayne county, Iowa in 1848; then crossed the plains with his wife and five children to Oregon in 1853. Lived in Brownsville the first winter, then moved to near Richard Finley's, then on his place on March 28th, 1855, where he died. He raised a family of eleven children, of which two are dead.
