ONE OF MEYERS' BILLS. — Senator Myers has introduced a bill in the interest of the laboring man, which he is confident will benefit the working classes. It provides that the receiver of a corporation shall pay its employees every 30 days. When a receiver takes charge of a corporation's business, he shall at once ascertain if any part of the wage roll for the past six months is unpaid. If such be the case, he shall first discharge the obligation, after meeting operating and other current expenses. From the time of accession he shall pay employees every 30 days in full. If he has not the money, he shall issue receivers' certificates, to draw 8 per cent

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

A Bad Railroad Accident.

PORTLAND, Or., Jan. 15.—The regular Sunday wool train on the Portland & Willamette Valley railway (narrow gauge) that left the Jefferson street station at 8 o'clock yesterday morning, met with a serious accident when two miles south of Oswego, which resulted in injuring more or less sixteen persons. Every one on board, except Conductor Kennedy and Engineer Miller, was hurt, several of them seriously and one or two probably fatally. There 17 men in the caboose, among whom were Sebel Herrman, I. A. Clarke, C. A. Clarke, all wool dealers; C. A. Stuart, a young man representing Dr. Poppleton, and H. C. Brandes, of Baum & Brandes, who was going out with Mr. Herrman to inspect a lot of wool. Brandes and Raphael Croze are probably fatally injured.

A Jailers Treatment.

BISMARCK, N. D., Jan. 15.—Harry Smith, jailer, lies in a cell here from which two prisoners have escaped. He is handcuffed and shackled and locked in, the prisoners having carried off the keys. The jailer's room is splattered with blood. He cannot be seen, as the outer door, as well as the inner door of the cell, is locked. He says the prisoners were locked in the cell when he went out to milk. When he returned he was struck on the head with a heavy iron, and knocked down and then hit again. He became unconscious, and when he came to he was locked in the cell.

Prompt Justice.

MOREL, Mex., Jan. 15.—The particulars have reached here of a terrible crime which was perpetrated near Cuernavaca. Pedro Malevo, a well known merchant, accompanied by his wife, left home a few evenings ago to visit friends in Cuernavaca, when within a few miles of their destination a band of outlaws attacked them. Malevo was murdered and robbed and his wife outraged by the outlaws. The news of the crime spread rapidly, and the commander of a military garrison immediately ordered out a detachment of 25 troops to pursue the perpetrators. The troops in a few hours came upon the villains, who made a desperate resistance and kept up the fight until three of them were killed. The other two were captured and shot. None of the soldiers were killed. A large amount of stolen property was recovered.

A Gang of Counterfeiters.
