

GOOD EVENING

**INGRAM CASE.**—The Statesman makes the decision in the Ingram case as follows: The State of Oregon vs. Frank Ingram, Linn county, R. P. Judge. Defendant appeals, affirming. George E. Chamberlain, attorney for the State, and H. H. Hewitt, for respondent, Weatherford and W. R. Blyden, for appellant. Per Curiam: The defendant indicted for murder in the first degree and convicted of murder in the second degree and sentenced to the penitentiary for life. The error presented is as to the challenge of jurors for actual bias, which is overruled by the trial court. The error is raised under sub division 2, in 185, of the code. The facts disclosed in empanelling the jury at the trial, the defendant by his attorney, George E. Chamberlain, acting upon the ground that he had an opinion as to the guilt or innocence of the defendant from reading the paper account of his first trial, and such opinion was a fixed one, and such examination by the court stated should form his opinion from the case, if he was taken as a juror, and he had no opinion that would influence his judgment, after hearing all the testimony. There was no error. State vs. Ingram, 177; Kumli v. S. P. R. Co., 505. In this last case, this subject has been thoroughly examined, and is a point that is involved. The next point is the introduction of the evidence of the deceased, which shows that the deceased was disinherited while the case was pending. It is held that the evidence of the deceased was not to be taken shortly before he was killed, but the taking of his testimony was objected to by the defendant. The object of this evidence was to show the motive of the prisoner in the crime. Under the circumstances, we find no error, and that, as a consequence, the judgment must be affirmed.

**THE ARE LIGHTS** serve very nice purpose besides illuminating the streets. At the corner of First and Second streets, under the cover to the right where it is warm and well protected, every night seven or eight little have been in the habit of roosting several months, flying away when the light comes. **VERY BOLD BURGLARY** occurred yesterday afternoon in the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Meyer, at the corner of Fifth and Sixth streets. Some evidently watching proceedings, opened a rear window, entered the house and stole \$70 in money, consisting of \$20 pieces, two \$10 pieces and \$10 cents and dimes, belonging to the Meyer boys, these were taken from a box, which was afterwards screwed her and left, as at first, \$5 in silver a gold medal belonging to Miss Meyer, received in graduating from the school. Some gold watches and jewelry were taken from their cases, but not the house. A revolver belonging to Meyer, with his name engraved, and a gold chain, were also taken. A drawer in the house was opened. The burglar was discovered a few minutes later to get any track every bold thief or probably thief, did the deed. Three men who left the night freight for the north acted suspiciously and may have been the men.
