

ANOTHER ROAD BILL.

Senator Cross of Clackamas has introduced a bill which empowers county courts to construct permanent roads throughout the county. It authorizes them to lay out, establish and improve by grading, draining, graveling or macadamizing. Upon the presentation of a petition signed by not less than 12 resident landowners whose lands are within two miles of the proposed improvement, the court may appoint an engineer and viewers to examine the route, and they are authorized to appraise all damages that will be sustained and assess the costs relatively upon such lands as will be benefited within three miles of the proposed road, and their report will be made to the county court, which will set a day for hearing objections, giving four weeks' notice by publication of such date. Parties whose lands are affected may remonstrate, showing cause. If a majority of those who are assessed to build the road remonstrate on the ground that it is not of public utility, the court will dismiss the expense sustained to be paid by petitioners. If the report of the viewers is approved the assessment as equalized by the court will stand and become a lien upon the property, dating from the filing of the petition. All work will be done by contract under the supervision of a competent person selected by the court, who must give ample bonds for the faithful performance of his duty. To pay for the improvement the court will issue certificates of assessment bearing 8 per cent interest, to be sold at not less than par. Parties assessed may pay their assessment at once or in 10 equal annual payments with accrued interest. If, in the opinion of the court, the road is of general rather than of local benefit it may pay not to exceed 50 per cent of the total cost of improvement from the county fund. This is not intended to repeal any law now in force, as the road after once built is to be kept up under the provisions of existing laws. We think that it is highly improbable that such a law can be passed. At all events it will instigate much opposition among farmers.

GOVERNOR MCKINLEY'S SPEECH

Governor McKinley has no apology to make for protection. His speech before the Ohio wool growers on Thursday was inspiring and confident. His ringing declaration, "I do not believe in giving up the fight after one engagement and one defeat," expresses the overwhelming sentiment of the republican party. The steadfast champion of protection bases his advocacy of that policy on the only foundation broad enough to lend it stability and permanency. Governor McKinley favors protection for all American interests, and is unalterably opposed to "having commodities free at one end of the factory and tariffed at the other end." If republicans firmly maintain this principle throughout the coming free trade experiment the future of protection is secure.—New York Press.

It can be said with an equal degree of candor and good sense, that the people have no apology to make to McKinley or any other man, for utterly condemning his scheme of protectionism in two very hot political campaigns, the one immediately succeeding the other. We are gravely told that "he does not believe in giving up the fight after one engagement and one defeat." Very well, there is nothing like pluck and courage in a good cause, hence it is safe to say that the people have no thought of allowing the protected barons of this country to snatch from their hand a twice earned and twice won victory.
