BEING COUNTIES RESPONSIBLE.—Sena-
tors have introduced a bill, proba-
bly by a case recently occurring
in this county, which explains itself.
Whenever any individual
lawfully traveling upon any public
way of this state, the same being a
county road, shall, without contri-
bution, negligence on his part, and not
being warned of the defect or dan-
ger, be injured or otherwise, sustain any
damage or injury in consequence of
defective and dangerous character of
road or bridge, either to his prop-
erty or person, he shall be entitled to
recover compensatory damages therefor
from the county in which such loss, damage
or injury occurred, by an action in the
district court of such county, or in a
court therein if the amount of
damages sued for be less than one thou-
sand (\$1,000) dollars.

THE NEW STEAM LAUNDRY is turning
out a good force of hands. The process
washing and ironing goods in such a

chinery in this laundry is first class,
with the first class work being done
by a competent superintendent. It

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THE STATE LEGISLATURE
In the Senate.—New bills: By Smith,
to regulate railway traffic between Celilo
and The Dalles; Myers, relating to the
practice of medicine; Bancroft, to define
and punish obstructions; passed.
Third reading of bills: Myers, to pro-
tect game, fish and song birds laid on the
table; Butler, to amend the code regard-
ing estates in dower; passed; Denny, to
amend the code regarding the distribu-
tion of personal property; passed. Ban-
croft, to build and furnish schoolhouses,
etc., passed.
In the House.—Third reading of bills:
By Jeffreys, to enable women to hold ed-
ucational offices; motion to indefinitely
postpone lost and bill passed 44 to 9.
Miller, to compile and print school books;
recommitted to education. Ormsby, to
establish an Oregon soldier's home; re-
passed, 43 to 9. Paxton, abolishing days
of grace on notes; passed.

Special to the Democrat
Salem, Or., Feb. 7th, 1893.—House:
Resolution that no bill be introduced ex-
cept by consent, or from committees on
salaries, ways and means and public
buildings, adopted. Passed: Bill to
make it a crime to break into cars; in-
creases pay of jurors in justice court to
two dollars and mileage. Committee to
investigate penitentiary have served
copy of charges on Supt. Downing and
begin to examine witnesses tomorrow.

Bills relating to proceedings in justice
courts by Miller passed. By Nickell to
make constable responsible for overt acts
of deputy, passed. By same, requires
assignee to publish notice of final settle-
ment by assignee, passed. To allow of
private sale in estates, passed. Wilkins
bill to have one railroad commissioner
act as clerk, passed.

Senate: Bills passed: Hirsch's bill
amending reform school law; Cross,
annexing Sellwood to Portland; Ban-
croft, to issue bonds for street and sewer
improvements in incorporated cities.
Croson's appropriation for agricultural
college. Woodard's resolution employ-
ing convict labor on public roads lost. Na-
tional Guard appropriation bill special
order at three o'clock.
