It Was a JOKE.—The Lumberman said: Matt Colman, the genial land locator, tells a pretty good story, which we believe is never before published. It happened about four years ago that Ed Wolf, who at the present time lives near six miles below here, was coming across the mountains by way of the Into Pass trail. Near the summit he met four hunters. On reaching civilization he reported having seen four Chicago Northwestern surveyors working in the mountains. This came to the ears of M. Hogg, manager of the Oregon Pacific railroad, and he telegraphed to come to Corvallis forthwith. A man was made up to investigate the story and they started on a special train going as far as Gates. They then took pack horses and crossed the mountains, returning by way of Portland. The trip failed to reveal the surveyors.

TAKE LEGACIES.—A number of men are earnestly in favor of Geer's new bill to tax gifts, legacies and inheritances, but it is doubtful if it will become a law, though in judgment of day it is a wise law. It proposes to tax property if the amount is over \$6000, which shall pass by will or the intestate law, \$1 on each hundred. On a \$10,000 estate the state would receive an income of \$100, on \$100,000 the sum of \$1,000, and from the late W. S. Ladd estate, if this law had been in force, the state would have received, supposing he had left \$10,000,000, the huge amount of \$1,000,000. Such a law prevails in New York state, where the Gould estate had to pay over \$700,000 into the tax of the state.

WHAT AN IMPULSE DID.—A few days ago Lon Young, a saloon keeper of Clatsop, Oregon, was returning home from Baker City on the cars. He was standing on the platform, when his hat flew off. On a sudden impulse, though the train was going at full speed, about thirty miles an hour, he jumped off after his hat. He was knocked insensible and his right side was paralyzed. THE STATE LEGISLATURE

SALEM, afternoon Feb. 10th.—In the senate, Denny's senate bill to prevent persons from trespassing, was amended on its second reading by striking out the dog clause. The bill was then referred to the judiciary committee.

Weatherford's senate bill, for a homestead law, received its second reading, and after an ineffectual attempt by Paxton to have it referred to the judiciary committee, it was ordered to its third reading.

In the House.—The senate joint memorial to congress for the issue of more legal tender notes to the amount of \$50,000,000 was adopted.

A message from the governor was received with his objections to house bill, for the equipment of the National Guards, made special order for next Tuesday at 10 a. m.

House bill, for the protection of game, water fowl, etc., was reconsidered and passed.

The world's fair bill, with the veto message of the governor, was received from the senate, and laid on the table for the present.

Up to last night thirty six bills had reached the governor. Of this number all but three were for city charter, and of the three general laws two had been vetoed.

Cross' bill providing salaries for county officers will give Marion county clerk \$2,000, deputy \$800, recorder \$1800, deputy \$800. Linn county is about the same.

SALEM, Feb. 10th.—House: Bills passed: Cooper, to elect road supervisors and general road law, allowing levy of two to four per cent; Northrup to fix hour of legislature to assemble at noon; Paxton, equity trials to be had before court, instead of referee except by stipulation of parties or where accounts are involved; Nickell to prevent sale of deer meat and other game out of season.

Senate amendments to Campbell pilot bill to have two commissioners reside in Astoria instead of Portland continued in, ayes 44 noes 11. Paxton gave notice of reconsideration. To authorize port of Portland to invest sinking fund in its own bonds.

The senate passed the game and fish, Warden, bill.

A DISTRICT CONVENTION of the Epworth League will be held at Corvallis, commencing on Tuesday, Feb. 23rd. A good program has been arranged and a large delegation is expected.
