WAGNER VS. BELKNAP.—The Salem Democrat gives the following account of the war at Salem heretofore mentioned: It appears that representative Belknep, who is supposed to represent Benton county, favors the petition, and his opponents charge that he does so for the reason that the county seat of the new county would be located in his neighborhood, and Mr. G. A. Wagner, on the part of the remonstrants intimated that there was an unholy alliance between the friends of Blaine and Lincoln (counties). Representative Belknep retorted to the effect that Mr. Wagner was an unholy liar, whereupon Mr. Wagner promptly reached for Mr. Belknep, but failed to find him. Immediately the room was in an uproar, and petitioners and remonstrants were mixed up in what threatened to be a first-class edition of Bonnybrook. In a short time, however, order was restored and upon an examination it was found that the whole affair had been as bloodless as a French duel.

A FESSIMIST.—Governor Pennoyer is decidedly a pessimist. His face is getting terrifically long, on nearly everything. Without regard to the right or wrong of his position in vetoing the military bill we give this following in his veto message as a sample of the gloomy view he takes of matters: "Our constitution provides that 'the militia shall be kept in strict subordination to the civil power,' but it would seem that now the militia is in the saddle, as it has had sufficient potency to procure a largely increased appropriation in the passage of this bill at a time when retrenchment in all civil departments is sought after on account of the depressed condition of our people consequent upon the stagnation of business and a general decrease in price, values and volumes of currency."

ANOTHER CHAPTER.—The Scio Press in its long writeup of the Serling murder closes with the following: "Many of our citizens attach blame to R. F. Ashby of Portland and Albany, for the fearful result of the match that he was instrumental in bringing about. Whether he is in the least blamable, we know not; but we have heard it said that Serling stated he was sorry he could not include Ashby in the killing."

THE STATE LEGISLATURE

SALEM, after noon of Feb. 10th.—Keady's bill for a jute mill at the state prison was referred to a special committee. Woodford moved a reconsideration of the vote by which the senate adopted a memorial for the issuance of \$50,000,000 paper fractional legal currency; carried. The resolution was lost. Vanderburg introduced a senate concurrent resolution asking the representatives in congress to labor to secure the free coinage of silver; adopted. Myers' bill, for injury sustained by reason of a defective road or bridge, was passed; Weatherford, salary of public officers, failed to pass. The evening was devoted to charter bills.

In the House—Ford's bill to amend the code relating to the levy of a tax for military and university purposes passed. Paxton's bill for a fish and game commission passed. The senate concurrent resolution requesting our senators and representatives in congress to vote for the free coinage of silver was made a special order for Friday next.

SALEM, Or., Feb. 11th, 1893.—House: Ford, school tax bill passed. Coon, to increase powers state board of horticulture, special order Monday at 3 o'clock. Beltz, regulating herding infected sheep, passed. For relief of Senator Maxwell passed. To protect beaver in Malheur and Baker counties, passed. To change name of A. J. city to Standford, passed. Senate bill relating to recorder of Umatilla Co. passed. To allow judge to order additional jurors to be drawn from box, passed. Senate Portland bridge bill with tolls amendment, committed. By Paxton to give lodging house keepers lien on baggage, passed.

In senate bills passed: Manley's for free bridges across Willamette at Portland; Keady's appropriating 1 hundred ninety thousand for penitentiary jute mill.

Investigation of asylum and penitentiary by legislature committees are closed and reports will be submitted to legislature next week before adjournment Friday.

The Willamette this afternoon is 4.8 feet above low water and is slowly rising.
