

GRESHAM A DEMOCRAT

A dispatch from Chicago says:

Judge Walter Q. Gresham is the central figure in a new political sensation. Judge Egbert Jamieson of Chicago, a personal friend of the coming secretary of state, sprung the matter today. The disclosure was elicited by expressions of opinion here that President-elect Cleveland had not only made a mistake in calling Gresham into his cabinet, but that the Judge had violated political decency in accepting the office, in the light of the fact that the appointment might be construed as a reward for deserting a party that had honored him.

Judge Jamieson said: "I do not speak from hearsay but from direct personal knowledge. Part of the Pennsylvania delegation to the republican national convention stopped over in this city on its way to Minneapolis. The day of their arrival I was invited by a prominent member of the delegation to meet a number of them at the auditorium. I went there and it was explained to me that while Pennsylvania was for Blaine, the contingency of a failure to nominate him had entered into their calculations. Gresham was their second choice, and they recognized in him elements that might consolidate the anti-Harrison strength to a greater extent even than Blaine. It occurred to me that it wasn't my funeral, and I laughingly asked what was wanted of me in connection with a national republican convention of any sort."

"I want you," said my friend, "to see Judge Gresham and find out if he will let us put him in training for the nomination in case it is ascertained that we can win with him and not with Blaine."

"You are sending a democrat on rather a queer mission," I replied, "but being your friend and a friend of Judge Gresham I will do what I can."

"I found Judge Gresham in his chambers, and had a conversation with him that lasted over an hour. I told him frankly what I had called for and outlined the situation as it had been given to me. The Judge said he appreciated the high compliment paid him, but that under no circumstances could he be considered as a possibility. 'I do not think it is possible to defeat Mr. Harrison for the nomination,' he remarked, 'but even if it were, and the nomination were offered me, I could not, as an honest man, accept it.'

"He then went on and defined his views on the tariff question. He was in thorough accord with Mr. Cleveland, and came out flat footed for revenue reform. 'On the tariff issue,' he said, 'I am as much of a democrat as you are, and entertaining such views, you must see that I could not be the candidate of the republican party for president.' There could be no mistaking his position. It was clear as sunlight."

The first act in the destruction of the federal election law, of which the chief purpose seems to be to support John I. Davenport from the public treasury, was done yesterday by the adoption of an amendment to the Sundry Civil bill limiting the fees of commissioners in federal election cases to prosecutions where the warrants have been issued on sworn complaints. This, if it becomes law, will discourage the heinous arbitrary proceedings by which the little despot of New York has thriven. Mr. Boutelle was the fit defender of the old order of things.

Congressman elect Goldsber, of Chicago, is in Vienna engaged in the pleasant task of selecting seventy pretty girls for the Austrian village at the world's fair. He intends to get the handsomest girls in Vienna if he can. Their duties will be to sell the leather and metal wares, toys and ornaments and meerschaum and amber goods which will be manufactured in the village. Each girl has to bind herself by a contract drawn with Spartan severity to pursue her calling without interruption from the time the fair opens until it is closed. This is to guard against their falling in love and getting married while the fair lasts.

The Kansas Populists are disposed to hold the nose of the Republican party as hard against the grindstone as the law allows, if not a little harder. On some accounts this is not entirely commendable, but it may be well enough that Kansas Radicalism should learn how it feels to be tramped on.

An ordinary photograph may be made luminous in the dark by a very simple process. Take white mount, coat it with starch paste, and sprinkle the paste with luminous powder. PREPARED TO DO BUSINESS.

While the *Globe* had hopes of the election of a democratic senator in Nebraska still there is a deal of consolation in the defeat of a republican and in the election of an independent. This insures democratic supremacy in the Senate and harmonizes both branches of the national legislature with the administration after March 4. For the first time in 30 years the democrats will thus have an opportunity to undoe republican legislation, to fill promises made to the people and right the wrongs that have enslaved and pauperized industry and industrial labor. That the party will be true to its trust there is no doubt. The democracy has fought its way into power against great odds and in spite of monopolists and corruptionists, and having at last reached the point of its ambition there will be no rest of arms until every wrong is righted, every class law repealed and every satellite and ap-iliator officially dismantled.—*Council Bluffs Globe*.

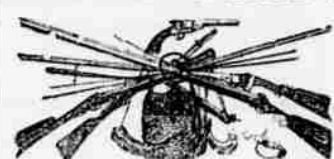
