GOOD EVENING.

AN EXTRAVAGANT LEGISLATURE.—The state tax levy has not yet been made. It will be as large or larger than two years ago. About all this legislature did was to vote appropriations, create offices and impose taxes. The money will be late and slow getting into the treasury. But it will be very fast getting out of there. The levy will probably be five mills or more. The people of this state have positive reason to dread any more sessions of the legislature like this one. The composition of it was good enough, but the influences that organized it and controlled it were promiscuous in the extreme.—Journal.—In fact Portland run the whole bakery.

The profits last year were: 1st series, 6.16; 2nd, 5.40; 3rd, 4.52; 4th, 4.34; 5th, 3.75; 6th, 3.33; 7th, 2.73.

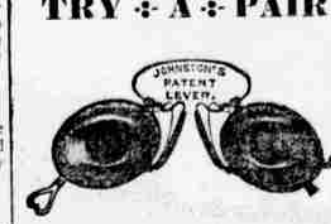

THE STATE LEGISLATURE

SALEM, afternoon, Feb 17th.—A large amount of business was rushed through on the closing day of the legislature. When the smoke clears away we will give a list of the bills passed.

Among the bills passed both houses, completing the circuit, were the following: By Keady, permitting bicycles on public roads; Paxton, no days of grace; Geer, fencing railroads; Miller, to improve Sodaville springs; general appropriation bill; amendment Australian ballot law; Myers, making counties liable for damages by defective roads. Matlock, for Eastern Oregon insane asylum; Weatherford, amending the law in relation to limits of school districts in cities; Blackman, to regulate the payment of the amount of insurance. The free college resolution was indefinitely postponed. Ford offered joint resolution No 16, relative to the apportionment of senators and representatives. Under a resolution of the House, the speaker, with two members appointed by him, will examine and correct the journals. The speaker appointed Merrill and Miller. Ford's bill abolishes the five mill school tax, and hereafter the levy for school purposes will be made on the per capita plan.

At this morning's session the investigation of the charges against Superintendent Downing was presented and that gentleman was entirely exonerated.

SALEM, Or., Feb 18th.—Both houses of the legislature met at 10 a m. Customary resolutions were passed thanking presiding officers and complimenting minority and majority parties. Addresses were made by presiding officers. All bills passed both houses were reported engrossed and signed. Governor has until Wednesday to examine and veto. Appropriations of session amount to over two millions. Resolutions of sympathy were tendered to Geo W McBride in his illness. Both houses adjourned sine die at 11 o'clock.

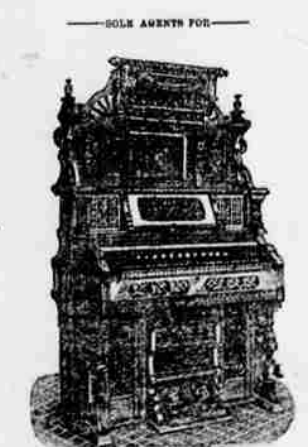
