

A MURDERER CAUGHT.—Hill, the man who murdered Summers in Colfax several months ago has just been arrested in Arizona. To Sheriff Jackson, of this city, is due considerable credit for his arrest. Hill after the murder came to Albany, and went up the Santiam, where he has relatives on the North fork. Sheriff Jackson learned of his presence here; but Hill slipped out before he could be secured, and made his way south to Arizona. A local sheriff there had been notified of his probable presence in that direction. Considerable correspondence followed between Hill and Sheriff Jackson, in which the Arizona man showed himself decidedly a one sided kind of a fellow. Other officers then were placed on track of Hill and succeeded in capturing him ahead of the one sent directly on his heels. He will be taken back to Colfax and will undoubtedly hang. The facts leading up to the arrest are interesting ones.

A RUNAWAY MATCH.—At the residence of A D Skaggs, in Lane county, on February 17th, 1903, Mr Bert Roberts, of Lane county, and Miss Lulu McBee, of Lane county, were married. The license for the marriage was granted on Feb 17th by County Clerk Payne, of this county, on the affidavit of W E Moore, and shows the age of the bride to be over 16 years. The consent of David and Mrs S J McBee is attached. Mr McBee was in the city Saturday for the purpose of having the person who signed the affidavit, who it is asserted used a fictitious name, arrested; and an investigation of the matter induced him to cease any such course. It seems that a sister of the bride signed the names of her parents to the affidavit, and the prosecution would involve her. The young couple threatened to run off and live together anyway until the young lady was 18, and she did it in order to prevent such a course, not realizing completely what she had done.

THE TAX ROLL.—County Clerk Payne has completed the task of carrying out the county assessment as ordered by the state board of equalization, a long and tedious job. The increased tax created will not be appreciated by many taxpayers, and most people begin to think this state board of equalization is a nuisance. Linn county people always foot their share of the tax. As carried out the total net assessment calls for a tax of \$156,354.74, or an unpaid poll tax of \$1087 of \$158,349.3. The state levy will be high and will probably take a third of this, at least \$50 of it. The roll has been turned over to Sheriff Jackson.

Hon J K WEATHERFORD, one of Linn county's able spokesmen in the senate, was born on the 3rd of March, 1856, in Putnam county, Mo. He came to Oregon in 1864, (his parents having died) and located at Brownsville, where he worked for about three years in the woolen factory, under Thomas Kay, now of Salem. After this Senator Weatherford attended school at Corvallis college for four years, and graduated in 1872. Returning to Brownsville, he taught school for a time. In 1874 he was elected county school superintendent and went to Albany and read law during his term, when not occupied with the duties of his office. Senator Weatherford was elected to the legislature of 1876, and was made speaker of the house, although he was the youngest member of that body. In 1875 he was admitted to the bar. In 1880 he was a Hancock elector, and in 1884 was elected from Linn county to the senate, of which body he has been a member ever since, except one session. Senator Weatherford was married in 1877 to Miss Nettie Cottle, at San Jose, Cal, and two boys brighten their home. Senator Weatherford has been practicing law in Albany since his admission to the bar, George E Chamberlain, attorney general, is now a partner of the senator's under the firm name of Weatherford & Chamberlain. MISFITS.

The mayor of Portland will receive \$3600 a year, and the Governor of Oregon \$1500. Which had you rather be.

The closing moments of the state legislature were taken up with the passage of resolutions of thanks, some of which were very silly and childish, and would have been discreditable to a legislature of school children.

The Salem Journal kept its eyes open and says what it thinks, and strikes the spike: This legislature is a record breaker and a record maker. It will do more to reconstruct Oregon politically than any session that ever met. There was a remarkable absence of politics but a continuous presence of a boodle, extravagance and vicious legislation.

The Junction City Times gets very mad on account of the failure to establish Blaine county, and says: "Next week we will handle the matter without gloves and these distinguished gentlemen will be shown up in their nefarious cowardly action." The distinguished gentlemen are all right, and it is fortunate for Oregon, a few men are in the legislature with back bone.

After July 1, 1894, the sheriff and clerk of Lane county will receive a salary of \$2,500 and the county will furnish deputies in addition thereto. The bill as amended cuts out the clause allowing the sheriff mileage and expenses for work within the county. When his official duties call him outside the county he is allowed his expenses which is a premium on letting a criminal get a good start. It is said this bill will give the sheriff of Lane county a net salary of about \$1,000. All sheriff's fees are to be paid in advance and the sheriff is not required to work after 5 p m. Eugene Guard. As the law does not go into effect until after the next election there can be no kicking. Men not wanting the office under the arrangement, will of course not run for it.

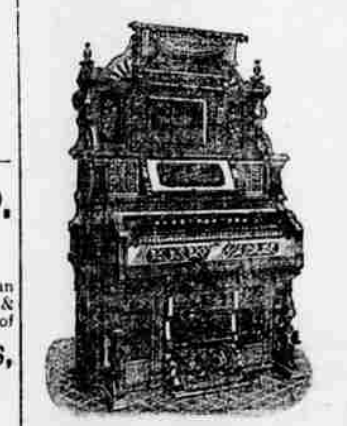
