TWO REPRESENTATIVES:

The Statesmen recently gave the following sketches:

A Blevins—One of Linn county's representatives in the house is A Blevins, who is a native of Kentucky, born in Clay county in that state on October 27th, 1837. His father removed to Van Buren county, Missouri, in 1841, residing there nine years. He then set out for Oregon, in 1850, crossing the plains with an ox team. His name was Isaac Blevins, and he settled in Linn county, on the Calapooia, about seven miles south of Albany. The subject of our sketch remained at home until of age. He then went to California and engaged in mining for a year, returning to Jackson county, where he was interested in mining and stock raising for a couple years. From there Mr Blevins went to Idaho and followed mining for six years in that territory and British Columbia. He then returned to Linn county and was married in September, 1879, to Lurina M Maxey, of that county, after which he purchased a farm about seven miles south of Albany and a wife and a half west of Tangent. Mr and Mrs Blevins have a family of five children living, two dead. They resided on the farm up to two years ago last fall, when they went to the town of Tangent to live. While Mr Blevins was on the farm he was at various times, for about six years all together superintendent of the Albany Farmers' Company warehouse, and all the time since he took up his residence in the town he has occupied this position. Mr Blevins represented Linn county in the legislature of 1887. He was again elected, on the democratic ticket, last June.

W F Elmore is a member of the Linn county delegation, and is a democrat. He was born in Jefferson county, East Tennessee, Feb 4, 1850, where he remained until March, 1875, when he came to Oregon and settled at Brownsville, Linn county, residing there until September, 1882, when he removed to Umatilla county and engaged in the stock business on Butler creek. This is now in Morrow county, near Heppner. Mr Elmore was there six years, when he returned to Brownsville, and has since resided there. He married at Brownsville January 1st, 1882, Mrs Louisa Carolin, and they have one child living and one deceased. Mr Elmore had a farm near Brownsville, but has lived in the town the past two years. He has been president of the Brownsville city council, and is a member of the A O U W, and Grange. Representative Elmore is a member of the standing committee on engrossed bills and manufactures.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

A Receiver Appointed:

PHILADELPHIA, Feb 20.—An application for a receiver for the Reading, made in a bill in equity, was filed by ex-Senator T C Platt of New York, as a holder of Reading bonds. The petition was granted and A A McLeod, president of the company, E P Willer, of the Lehigh Valley division, and Chief Justice Passon, of the state supreme court, appointed receivers in a bond of \$500,000. The total amount lost by the stockholders in Reading since February 1, is estimated at \$34,063,112.

Indians vs Chinamen.

UMATILLA, Or Feb 20.—Bad blood exists between Indians and Chinese at this point, and trouble may result. During the past few weeks wood has been scarce at the Indian village, and to keep from freezing the Indians have been tearing down portions of a large frame, which was built for mining purposes by a company of Chinese several years ago. The Chinamen expended over \$5000 in building the frame. Today a squad of armed Chinamen surprised some squaws as they were breaking down a part of the frame and drove them from the scene. The Indians are desperate.

Beauregard Dead:

NEW ORLEANS, Feb 20.—General G T Beauregard, one of the last of the generals of the Confederate military service, died tonight. The first symptoms of the fatal illness were manifested two weeks ago, when he was attacked by a complication of diseases which threatened heart failure. The direct cause was heart failure. The funeral will be held Wednesday.

The Work Done:

SALEM, Feb 20.—Now that the legislature is over and its work summed up, it is seen that in all 200 bill have been passed out of the 700 introduced. Of those which passed, 111 originated in the house and 89 in the senate. Fifty-three were amending city charters or incorporated towns, and 24 carried appropriations. The majority of the remainder were only minor amendments to the code.

Getting Haggish.

WASHINGTON, Feb 20.—Senator Mitchell was fortunate today in getting through an amendment to the sundry civil bill, increasing the limit of the cost of the post of Portland public buildings from \$500,000 as it first stood, to \$1,000,000. It will, of course, take a hard fight to keep the house from cutting out this amendment, as the economists there will do all in their power to prevent the increase.

A Democrat Elected.

BISMARCK, N D, Feb 20.—W N Roach, democrat, was today elected United States senator from this state. Mr Roach was elected by a combination of democrats and independents, aided by some republicans.
