A BROADENING PARTY.

The selection of Judge Gresham to be the Secretary of State in President Cleveland's Administration has called forth much comment in the press of the country. Some features of this comment are especially notable.

The testimony to Judge Gresham's high character, his devoted patriotism and his eminent qualifications for the office is practically unanimous. Neither Democrat or Republican suggests that he lacks wisdom or training for the duties that will devolve upon him.

Nor is there from any quarter intimation of doubt that he is in full accord with the public policies of the Democratic party as lately formulated, of which Grover Cleveland is the most conspicuous representative and of which he is to be the responsible executive.

There is therefore no reason to question that in the State Department Judge Gresham will honor the nation and the Democratic party. What can any Democrat ask more than that?

The Democratic party has suffered from too much narrowness of party spirit. Its growth has been impeded for that reason. If it is to be in future the dominant party of the nation it must show a generous and hospitable spirit. Valiantly as it fought, the "old guard" did not win the last election alone, nor was it won on the lines of old contests.

The new conditions must be frankly and cordially accepted, and the new forces which rally to our standard and support our principles must be not merely tolerated, but welcomed and made to feel at home.

This is the policy of wisdom, of statesmanship, of growth. It is the policy of permanent establishment.

The original plan of pension reform has received the approval of the Pension Committee of the House, and there is to be a sharp fight between the reformers and the undiscriminating pension advocates. A spectacle to amaze the country is Mr. Holman in the role of an opposer of just retrenchment and economy. He will fight in the House, it is stated, for the present reckless, absurd, wasteful and unsystematic "system." The committee proposes to transfer the Pension Bureau to the War Department, which will withdraw it, to some extent, from the control of pension cranks and sharks. Widows of ex-soldiers who married such ex-soldiers over five years after their discharge are not to have pensions. Persons with incomes of over \$600 a year and able to make a living by manual labor are not to have pensions, and pensions within a given class are to be uniform. There are other sensible proposals, all looking to the correction of existing abuses.

In Washington city in the employment of the government at a salary of \$1800 per year, is an ex-soldier named W. E. Davis who draws a pension of \$19 per month for deafness. He operates a telephone. Can any one doubt when such cases as these are brought to light that the frauds in the pension department should be thoroughly overhauled and investigated? Every honest soldier and pensioner in the land should join in the demand for the unearthing of the frauds that have made it almost creditable on the part of a deserving soldier to accept a pension.

Only twenty-two miles of the Panama canal remain to be dug, if faith may be put in the statement made by officers of the original company. Intelligent Americans who have been employed on the canal say that there are forty-seven miles to be completed, the whole distance from ocean to ocean, not a mile of the canal having been actually finished. The dredges threw up the dirt on either side, and when the pile reached a certain height it fell into the ditch. This was the case all along the canal as far as the work progressed. One of the workmen says that not twenty-five feet can be called finished work.

The doors of the democratic party are always open to good men—men of brains and high social and official standing. This is one of several reasons why Judge Gresham's selection to the secretaryship of state by President-elect Cleveland is a bit of most welcome news to fair democrats in every neighborhood throughout the country. Judge Gresham is not only a valuable acquisition to the democracy, but a wise choice on the part of Mr. Cleveland, who is endeavoring to surround himself with cabinet secretaries who will serve to dignify and make efficient his administration.

The largest vessel yet built on the Weir, in England, and said to be the greatest cargo vessel in the world, was successfully launched last month. The vessel, which is built of steel, is 465 feet long, 32 feet breadth and 35 feet depth, has a gross register of 6425 tons, deadweight capacity of 9250 tons on 25 feet draught, and gross displacement of 13,600 tons. The engines will drive the vessel when fully loaded a speed of 10½ knots.

The statements published by the Tribune asserting that Mr. Carlisle had expressed strong dissatisfaction with the selection of Judge Gresham as secretary of state are untrue. Mr. Carlisle knew of Mr. Cleveland's intention to appoint Judge Gresham, and warmly approved of it.—New York World.

HAWAII AND THE SUGAR BOUNTY.

Hawaii produces about 265,000,000 pounds of sugar annually.

It has been suggested, with some apprehension, that if we extend a protectorate over the islands or in any fashion attach them to our territorial possessions we shall have to pay to the producers of this sugar the same bounty which we are now paying to sugar growers here. At that rate the bounty on Hawaii's sugar would amount to more than \$5,000,000 annually.

But there is no occasion for apprehension on that score. Whatever we may do with respect to Hawaii, we are not going to annex a new sugar bounty charge upon the Treasury. On the 4th of March the Government of the United States will pass under control of a party which utterly repudiates the policy of taxing the people for money with which to pay men for engaging in unprofitable business. The Democratic party is not going to extend the sugar bounty. It is going to abolish it.

When as thoroughgoing a party man as Senator Voorhees can say that "on all the great questions and principles of government now before the public mind I know Judge Gresham to be a Democrat of the Jeffersonian school," there is not much occasion for criticism. Judge Holman too, says: "The selection meets with my hearty approval. Judge Gresham is a man of great ability and purity, and his selection is a most sagacious one. His ability and his honesty and the fact that he is thoroughly independent of certain great influences have attached many people to him, and he has a large following of men, who, while not yet outside of the Republican party, are in sympathy with lower taxation, greater economy in the public expenditures and all the great issues advocated by the Democratic party." This is pretty good Democratic endorsement from Judge Gresham's own State.
