CITY OFFICIAL PAPER.

GOOD EVENING.

THE NEW SCHOOL LAW.—As stated yesterday the new school law does not apply to Albany. It states distinctly that the last U S or state census shall regulate the matter. The census of 1890 gives the incorporated city a population of 3079 according to a census bulletin on our table. Hence the election will have to proceed as heretofore, and a clerk as well as directors be elected. Obenauer's census of 1892, which is undoubtedly correct, gives Albany 4682, but will not count under this law. Senator Wealthorford does not state that Albany will come under the provisions of the law. The district will remain the same as now. This is to be regretted as the provisions of the law are good ones, and would advance the interests of our public schools. But figures are figures.

RESOLUTIONS.—At a meeting of the Ladies Aid Society held Tuesday, Feb. 22, 1893, the following resolution was presented and by motion adopted and ordered published:

Whereas: There was held at the Albany Opera House on Wednesday evening, Feb. 14th, a dancing party purporting to be given for the benefit of the Orphan Home, and whereas said dancing party was not authorized by the Ladies Aid Society in charge of said Home, and none of its officers were consulted in reference to the same.

Therefore be it Resolved, That we regret the use of the Orphan Home name in any such manner, and that the person or persons who caused the name of said Orphan Home have laid themselves liable to censure.

LINCOLN COUNTY.—Governor Penoyer last evening appointed the new officers for Lincoln county, nearly as stated heretofore by the Democrat, and as follows: Sheriff, Geo A Landis, Newport; county judge, D F Blue, Yachima; clerk, B F Jones, Toledo; commissioners, M L Trapp, Chilwot, J O Stearns, Waldport; treasurer, Henry Denlinger, Toledo; assessor, Thos E Parker, Yachima; school superintendent, Chas Booth, Yachima; coroner, Jas Russell, Yachima; surveyor, Josiah Gideon, Lower Alsea. The county on its birth, does not contain a single attorney. This will not last long. Look out for the advent of plenty of legal lights.

SOME VETOES.—Last evening Governor Penoyer vetoed bill 55, because the same as No 154, and bill 180, because a duplicate of 86; the Durham bill amending the Australian ballot law because the effect of the change proposed by this bill would be to destroy, in a measure, the secrecy of the ballot, and to afford an opportunity for votebuying. The result, it is most certain, would be desired neither by the legislature nor the people. Fish and game bill 110 because the same as 108 signed by him, and bill 103 relating to foreclosure and satisfaction by mortgages.

NOT INSANE.—Andrew L Arnold, on complaint of C D Compton and Thos Large was brought to Albany and examined by Judge Duncan, Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Wyatt, and Drs Hill and Wallace, today on a complaint of insanity. The commission after a thorough investigation declared him not insane, and he was discharged. Arnold is the man who burned the barn of A R McDonald. He is free on \$500 bonds. His bondsmen though are considering the advisability of giving him up to the Sheriff. The case is becoming somewhat interesting.

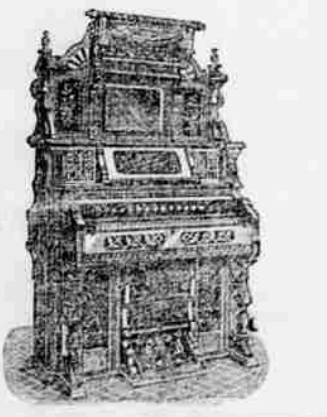
