REV. H. M. WALLER, of the Christian church, died at his home in Albany Saturday night, of heart disease, at the age of 5 years. He had given up active work some time ago, and was passing the closing years of his life in an unostentatious manner. Rev. Waller was born in Indiana Sept. 9th, 1817, and began preaching while young, teaching school at the same time. He came to Oregon in 1847 as a missionary and settled near Monmouth, Polk county, where he has since resided until a year or two ago, when he moved to Albany. He assisted in organizing the first church of the Disciples of Christ on the coast. He was married in 1850 to Mary E Davidson, and six children, five of whom are living, blessed the union. Rev. Waller was a man of sterling, Christian character, and many in Oregon mourn his death.

APPLIES TO THE O. P.—Senator Myers enjoys the unusual distinction of having a bill approved by the governor. It is the one requiring receivers to issue certificates of indebtedness to employees for wages due. It provides that whenever the business or property of any person, company or corporation is placed in the hands of a receiver, whether upon foreclosure or creditors' bill, the receiver must at once report to the operating judiciary the various amounts owing by the firm to its employees. The court must then order the receiver to pay out of the receipts and earnings thus coming into his hands, after satisfying the current expenses, all wages and earnings of employees and laborers accrued six months prior to his accession. The receiver must also be ordered to pay the employees their current wages every 30 days. If he does not take in money enough to satisfy these claims, he must issue certificates of such indebtedness, to draw interest at 8 per cent per annum. The act is now in force.

A resident of Salt Lake city has a copy of a mortgage made in Boise City in 1861. It was to secure \$170, with interest at 10 per cent every month, the interest in case of default to be added to the principal and compound semi-annually. The mortgage was never satisfied, and as it amounts, according to the terms, to \$45,972,003.82, and is still growing, there are grave fears that it never will be paid.

Of course this notice cannot now be given and there is no possibility of making the assessment by the time required, so there can be no levy for school purposes this year, they say, which will leave the districts without funds or authority to contract indebtedness on bonds.—Statesman.
