

TERMINAL RATES.—Last night a petition signed by the business men of Albany generally, and a resolution of the board of trade, were sent to the S P officials to meet this week in convention to arrange rates at Sacramento, Calif. They asked that Albany be given terminal rates. The importance of this movement can hardly be estimated. If granted, as there is a good prospect of its being done, it would mean thousands of dollars benefit to our city. Already we enjoy privileges in reference to rates; but this would give us an additional advantage, one that Albany by reason of her central location and commercial interests is entitled to. Albany is destined to be a wholesale city, and should begin early in gaining such a foothold as will place her on commercial equality with any city on the coast. This move is in the right direction and should not be dropped until the object is secured.

MURDER AT LEBANON

Joe Grubbe shot through the heart by Morg Wassom.

Lebanon was thrown into excitement this morning by the report of a murder, which first accounts pronounce a cold blooded affair. Further particulars may change the aspect of the case, though the indications are otherwise. Accounts of murders are always confusing, and never lose that aspect on trial. Those given of this unfortunate affair are as follows. Several months ago, somewhere near a year, Morg Wassom, a son of Jonathan Wassom, one of the wealthy citizens of the county, a young man about 35 years of age, and Joe Grubbe, one of the two saloon keepers of Lebanon, had a quarrel in the latter saloon, resulting in Wassom's being ejected from the place. Wassom never entered the saloon again, until 2 o'clock this morning. After spending the night, mostly at Vm Gny's saloon, and, when somewhat intoxicated, just how much, as in all such cases is not satisfactorily agreed upon, Wassom went to Grubbe's saloon alone. Mr Grubbe was behind the bar, while M S Wallis, a Portland liquor drummer, and J Mosholder, of Lebanon were in front. It is said playing cards. Wassom remarked: "I understand you have been blowing about putting me out of your saloon. If you'll come out in front we'll settle the matter." Grubbe said his place was behind the bar, where he would stay. Wassom was quieted down and treated the crowd, and Grubbe did the same, coming out from behind the bar with the others. When just outside the front door Wassom suddenly drew a revolver and fired without warning, hitting Grubbe in the heart, and the man fell a corpse in the door. The men claim not to have seen the shooting. Wassom left the saloon, and walked home, where he was arrested, without resistance, and will be given an examination this evening. Hon J K Weatherford was telegraphed to defend him, and left on the 12:30 train for Lebanon.

Coroner Farrell went to Lebanon this forenoon, and held a coroner's inquest over the body of Grubbe.

Grubbe was about forty years of age, and leaves a wife and three children. He came to Lebanon from Kansas about five years ago, and was at one time Marshal of Lebanon. He was a large man and is mentioned as being a good natured fellow.

Morg Wassom was unmarried. He was a tall, angular man, quiet around the streets, but somewhat quarrelsome when intoxicated. He is in good circumstances being worth \$7,000 to \$8,000, and will no doubt fight the case to the end. Those knowing him say he would not do anything of the kind except when intoxicated.

LEBANON, Or., Feb 28th.—Verdict of coroner's jury is that Joseph Grubbe's death was caused by a bullet fired from a pistol in the hands of Morgan Wassom. Preliminary trial going on as you go to press.

THE NEW ASSESSMENT LAW is a puzzle. If it means what it says it will revolutionize the business, and City Marshals and Recorders won't be in it at all. The Man About Town has tramped over its provisions and judges that the county assessor does all the assessing for the county, cities and school district, extra columns being introduced in the roll to keep the figures distinct. When completed the county clerk shall compute the aggregate value in each of the incorporated cities and in the school districts, the cities arranged alphabetically, and school districts according to number, a certified copy of which must be furnished the recorder or school clerk on application, and the city and district must notify the county clerk of the amount of the tax levy made before February 1st of each year. All such taxes shall be collected by the same officer in the same manner and at the same time as taxes for county purposes are collected. It shall be the duty of the tax collector to pay to the county treasurer as often as once a week all taxes collected and he shall inform the treasurer whenever he pays over to him any of the money so collected what amounts thereof will be credited to the several funds for which they are respectively collected, taking the receipt of the treasurer in triplicate for the receipts paid to each fund, one of which receipts for each fund he shall retain, file one with the clerk of the county court, and furnish one to the school district, town or city for which each of such amounts are paid in. Under which it will be seen the sheriff collects the taxes for the county, city and school districts, and then turns them to each respectively, completely knocking out city marshals and district clerks in this matter.

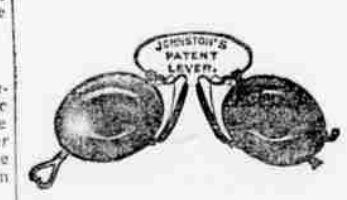

The Willamette Valley sailed for San Francisco yesterday, being delayed several days on account of rough weather.

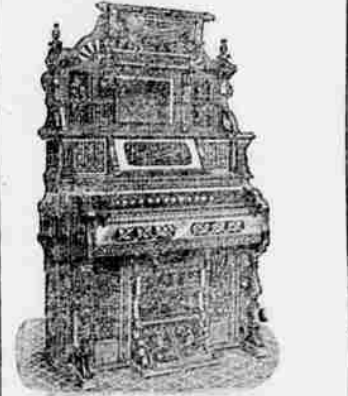
