

THE FISH LAW.

At the request of several fishermen, we publish a couple of sections of the fish law below.

1945. Any person or persons who shall take, catch, kill, molest, injure, or destroy fish on any fish ladder, fishway, or other structure or superstructure for the passage of fish, or shall, with any seine, or nets, fish-traps or other device, obstruct the free passage of fish in the channel of the approach, to said fish ladder, or way, or other structure or superstructure, for a distance of six hundred feet from the approach of said ladder or way, or within two hundred and fifty feet from the upper portion of said fish ladder or way, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each offense, and each additional fish after the first so taken, caught, killed, molested, injured, or destroyed shall constitute and be deemed a new and separate offense within the provisions of this act; a justice of the peace shall have jurisdiction to try all violations of this act.

Section 4. It shall not be lawful for pound-net, set-net, trap, weir, or other fixed appliance for taking fish, to extend more than one-third of the way across the breadth of any stream, channel, or slough at the time and place of such fishing; and any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof be fined in a sum not less than fifty dollars nor more than two hundred and fifty dollars.

THE NEW LAW

The amendment to the old law passed at the recent session of the legislature fixes the close season as follows:

Sec. 3. It shall not be lawful for any person or persons to take or fish for salmon in the waters of the Nehalem, Tillamook, Naituca, Salmon, Siletz, Yaquina, Alsea, Siuslaw, Umpqua, Coos Bay, Coquille, Siletz, Elk, Chetco, Rogue River, Winchuck, or any of their tributaries, from the first day of November, until the fifteenth day of December, or between the fifteenth day of April and the first day of June.

During the close seasons, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to receive or have in his possession, or offer for sale, or transportation, or to transport any Chinook salmon, silver salmon, steelhead, blueback. The penalty for violating this act is a fine of not less than \$10 or more than \$250.

A bill before the New York legislature proposes to give any member of the legislature who has served seven years admission to practice before any of the courts of the state. Like most such laws this was aimed pretty straight to hit an individual case. One of the legislators who has served seven years in the assembly wants to qualify as a lawyer without the study that is required of other candidates for such practice. The bill ought to be defeated. There is nothing in the way that most men secure office that presumptively fits them for doing anything. It is not even to be presumed that they know anything about law, or, in fact, any other matter. They do not go into the legislature for what they themselves are. Most of them are bad notes signed by irresponsible parties, but so their endorsement is good they are to be accepted on the strength of that. It is a bad sign for a legislator who tries to use the law making power to help his private fortunes. It is safe to say now that he would not make a good lawyer, and what is still worse, is not fit to hold the office he is trying to use for his personal advantage.

Judge William Lindsay, the new Senator from Kentucky, is a man full of resources. On one occasion he had a bad case and was abusing the opposite party to the suit roundly. Finally he said something specially offensive, when the party approached him and whispering in his ear said: "I will give you just five minutes to retract that remark. If you don't do it I will kill you." "Well," said Judge Lindsay, smiling, "what do I want to wait five minutes for? I will take it back right now."

President Harrison, following the precedent set by Cleveland in 1889, when the former was inaugurated, has invited Cleveland to ride with him to the inaugural ceremonies. Mr Cleveland did the same thing in 1889. Mr Harrison has taken the pains to have the executive mansion handsomely prepared for the reception of the Cleveland household. The wire is made by drawing through drilled diamonds.

Experiments were recently made at Toulon, France, for illuminating the bottom of the sea with electric lamps. The apparatus employed was sunk on six fathoms and it illuminated the bottom to a radius of 100 feet. It is thought that the lamp will be of the greatest value for surveying wrecks or for reconnoitering for concealed torpedoes.
