

THE TREASURY

The treasury is about exhausted. According to the deceptive bookkeeping which Mr Foster has adopted for the purpose of concealing the truth, there is about \$23,000,000 in cash on hand. If the held up appropriations were taken into account a large deficiency would be apparent.

As to the gold reserve, as the World has already pointed out, it has been broken into. Of the \$104,000,000 of gold now in the treasury \$5,000,000 belongs to the New York banks that have loaned it to the treasury. This leaves \$99,000,000 belonging to the government.

This condition of the public finances is a disgrace to the expiring administration and its party. By reason of the extravagance of the Billion Dollar Congress and of the selfish indifference of the executive in these difficult days the treasury is in debt on current demands, and it has impaired the reserve which was set apart for the redemption of the greenbacks. It might have avoided the debt if it had not been bent on squandering the surplus which it inherited from Mr Cleveland's administration. It might have secured the reserve by exerting its influence to procure the repeal of the Sherman act. It preferred to relieve the protected industries from the dread of a surplus and to add to the burdens of the people, and now it prefers to throw on the new administration the responsibility of its own and its party's misdeeds rather than to save the country from the threat of disaster.

The next administration will have great financial problems to face that have been created and shirked by the present one.

OFF FOR INAUGURATION.

The train bearing President Cleveland and party left Lakewood for Washington Thursday. The train consisted of a fast engine, baggage car, directors' private car of the New Jersey Central road, President Myer's private car of the Baltimore and Ohio road, and the private cars of President Austin Corbin of the Long Island road, and the last for Cleveland's private use. It is an exceedingly sumptuous vehicle with parlors, bedrooms, bathrooms, electric lights, etc., and all richly furnished. Mr and Mrs Cleveland with Baby Ruth drove to the train. In the hotel bus. Nearly the entire population turned out to bid them farewell. Mrs Cleveland went first and Mr Cleveland followed, shaking hands with those nearest him. He declined to accede to calls for a speech, and, entering the car, the conductor gave the word and the train pulled out.

The following were on board: Mr and Mrs Daniel Lamont, Mr and Mrs Don Dickinson, Mr and Mrs Richard Watson Gilder, Dr and Mrs John D Bryant, E C Benedict and family, Mrs S M Williams and daughter, and Mr Robert O'Brien, personal secretary to Mr Cleveland. Eight special trains carrying 3400 Tammany braves also left New York city. A large club from Chicago, Governor Tillman and staff of South Carolina with a large party, and Governor Flower and thousands of others are going up to Washington to witness the inauguration of the great leader.

Senator Hill directs attention to the fact that 4,000,000 Americans who were entitled to vote failed to do so in the last election, and 1,500,000 of these were in the south. If representation in congress were to be cut down to the proportion of stay-at-home voters, the south would lose 32 members of congress, while the north would lose 65. The republicans claim to know why there is so light a vote in the south. Will they explain why a like state of things exists in the north?

Calculations, based on the observation of the refraction of light, have caused it to be supposed that the air becomes so rare at the height of about 60 miles that the distance may be regarded as the limit to its sensible extent, but other calculations made during the present century, of the distance of the earth at which meteors ignite, indicate that the atmosphere extends upwards of 100 miles.

The prevalence of sun spots is intimately connected with the occurrence of magnetic storms on the earth's surface. The sun gives us of its heat but one part in 22,000,000. How to get one part more, how to further utilize the solar energy that is going to waste, is one of the great problems to be solved.

Public Opinion announces that Mr W H Prosser, the well known electrician, has succeeded in sending a telephonic message from the shore of the Bristol Channel, near Cardiff, to the island of Porthleven, three miles off, without the intervention of a connecting wire.

NEW STEEL PROCESS

Benjamin Bazelle, a St Louis man, has invented a process of steel manufacturing, that, it is claimed, far eclipses the discovery of Bessemer, and will also reduce the cost of steel rails; that they can, by its use, be sold at a good profit for one-half the present expense of making them. By Bazelle's process it is asserted that either pig iron or steel can be made direct from the ore with a gas fuel, and it is claimed that by the process the best Bessemer pig iron can be made for less than \$10, and steel in the billet for \$12.50 a ton. Bessemer received \$1,000,000 on the American rights of his patent, the Carnegie Steel Co., and other large concerns being the purchasers. If Bazelle's process will do all that is claimed for it, Bessemer's invention will be worthless, as it cannot compete with the other. That some people have faith in the St Louis man's discovery is evidenced by the fact that the coming week a company will be organized in this city with a capital of \$1,000,000 to build a large plant in East St Louis during the next three months to manufacture pig iron and steel by his process.

No man ever assumed the executive duties of the federal government with so many grave problems calling for solution as Grover Cleveland when he takes charge next Saturday. There is the Behring Sea fishing question, the Hawaii annexation question, the silver question, the pension question and last, but by no means least, the tariff question. It would be almost like a miracle if all these grave questions should be settled to the general satisfaction of the public during Mr Cleveland's administration. But the best efforts of Cleveland and his advisers will be made in that direction.

The Nicaragua canal when completed will be one of the highest commercial importance to the Pacific States, but under no circumstances should the United States permit it to pass from our government control.

It is highly probable that to day (March 3, 1893) will forever mark the end of republican rule in this land of ours.
