GOOD EVENING.

A TRAMP ACCIDENT.—After the local train came in from Portland last night four men, evidently tramps, were seen by Nightwatch McCain on the platform, who ordered them forward out of the city. They left for the south and camped at the regular tramp "cross roads" at the Lebanon Junction. The overland at 10:30 stopped and registered according to rule. The men jumped for the blind baggage as it started out. Three boarded in safety; but the fourth fell back, his right foot struck the rail and the foot was smashed and cut at the instep, requiring the amputation of the toes, and his head was badly bruised and cut up. The man was taken to the residence of James Elkins, where he was taken in, and Frank Elkins came for a doctor, and Dr. Maston, the regular S. P. surgeon, who in the meantime had been telegraphed for from Halsey by the conductor. The man was properly cared for. He gave his name as Richard Otto. He was born in Saxony about 25 years ago, has a family in St Paul, and is a member in good standing in the A O U W having his credentials, showing payments to February, 1893. He is a cooper by trade and has been in Portland a year. The railroad company refused to take the responsibility of the case, and Otto is now in the care of the county, and will be given good treatment.

THE GAME LAW.—Under the new game laws grouse, quail, pheasant, China pheasant, silver, golden, copper, green or Japanese, bob-white, jacksnipe or prairie chicken can only be killed from October 15th to November 15th, and it is against the law to transport them any other time. Trout can only be sold in Sept and Oct. It makes it a misdemeanor to hunt or kill deer between December 1st and August 1st of the year following, or on any day between one hour after sunset and one-half hour before sunrise. One law which goes into effect in ninety day makes it a misdemeanor to hunt, kill, any male deer or buck or female deer or doe between the first day of November and the first day of August of the following year. The killing of a spotted fawn at any season is a misdemeanor. The law provides that every person who shall between the 15th day of November and the 1st day of August of the following year kill, except for breeding purposes, or shall offer for sale any grouse, pheasant, Mongolian pheasant, quail or prairie chicken shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. The penalty for a violation of this act is fixed at a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$300 or confinement in the county jail for three months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

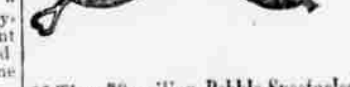

INTERESTING FIGURES.

According to the report of the experts the Oregon Pacific is 142 miles long, in operation, 128 1/2 of grade and partly between end of track and summit, and 14 of grade on Mathews division Eastern Oregon. Equipment of road, 16 engines and 353 cars, steamboats, etc.

About 50,000 crosses needed; banks narrow, but good; grade in good line and surface; bridges need renewal within three years at a possible cost of \$200,000. Line on Cascade mountains well located and constructed. Very liberal estimates of cost of construction, \$4,000,000—it should be duplicated for \$3,500,000. Timber on western slope of Cascade about 40 miles wide; runs from 25,000 to 200,000 feet per acre, in all capable of giving the road business for some years until cut off. Construction and operation of the road has been of decided advantage to the Willamette valley in reducing rates of freight, although so far the railroad has not shared in the advantages so gained. Statements show the earnings from April 30, 1885, to Oct 28, 1890, and expenses: giving gain \$105,135.06. During the receivership from Oct 28, 1890 to Dec 31, 1892, show loss \$175,114.07. Earnings apparently inflated during construction of the line. Earnings of O P R.R. for last half of 1892 were \$518 per mile, or a little \$2000 per mile per average—much below what they should be. During receiver's certificates authorized and most all issued. Receiver's debts for payroll and vouchers to March 1st, \$258,475.97. If such results were conclusive the rails would be taken up and the property abandoned, as no ownership could stand such a drain. Probable cost of equipment and extension from end of track to Deschutes river, 72 miles, \$1,250,000. Entire failure of the scheme has created wide distrust throughout the Willamette valley, and particularly among business men, to the injury of the property and its traffic. Conditions could not be worse than those now existing, indicating inefficiency of the management and that it is entirely responsible for the failure to build the line and operate with reasonable success. Recommendations are given as heretofore stated.
