GOOD EVENING.

WILL OPEN.—The Salem Independent

says: William Goltra, one of the directors of the Linn County National Bank, was in the city yesterday and says that the bank expects soon to commence business again. Arrangements to that effect are now pending and it is expected to be but a matter of a few days until things are running along as smoothly as usual. He says that the flurry in Albany has settled down and that confidence seems to be restored.

A Bush, of Salem, and Mr Ladd, of Portland, will meet with the Albany directors and Mr Jennings, the bank inspector tonight, and if satisfactory arrangements can be made the bank will open.

BASE BALL.—Saturday at Independence Albany was defeated by the club of that city 13 to 7. Wells was in the box for Albany part of the game. McGreevy having been signed with Oakland, and Stanley the remainder of the game. An audience of only 20 or 30 was present. Yesterday in the presence of about 500 people Albany defeated Independence 11 to 6. Burns was in the box and did some excellent work.

At Portland Oregon City defeated the Portland 10 to 3 Saturday and 8 to 4 Sunday.

Tomorrow the Independence and Albany clubs will play at Newport an exhibition game.

The Willamettes defeated the Oak Creek yesterday 33 to 13.

A WHOLESALE MERCHANTS EXCURSION.

The Oregon Pacific railroad company have arranged to run a Wholesale Merchants' Excursion from San Francisco to Albany on July 27th. The steamship "Willamette Valley" will leave with this party on the evening of that day, arriving at Yaquina on the 29th or 30th. The San Francisco Board of Trade will attend this excursion in a party. It is the intention to entertain them in the same way that they entertained the Oregon merchants on their recent trip. It is desirable that these merchants should visit as many points in the Willamette valley as possible. They will be allowed five days to spend throughout the valley. Another Merchants' Excursion will probably be started for San Francisco on Aug 14th. All arrangements will be made to entertain them nicely upon their arrival in San Francisco.

HEAVY DAMAGES WANTED.—J C Boyd, of Springfield colony scheme and other things of like nature, has commenced suit against E W Allen and wife to recover \$20,000. It is claimed that defendant, by word of mouth and letters written, were instrumental in preventing Boyd being put in charge of the horticultural display in the Oregon building at the World's fair grounds. As a result Boyd estimates his pecuniary loss by failing to secure the position, and the detriment he alleges his good name to have suffered thereby at \$20,000. The trouble, it is said, had its origin during the cotton exposition at New Orleans several years ago.—Register.

KICKED OFF.—Geo. Parks got on the overland train at Eugene this morning in an intoxicated condition. Wick Huff, the conductor, asked for his fare, as he was trying to beat his way. He let him ride to Harrisburg where he ordered him off, but he stayed on. A mile below Harrisburg he stopped the train and put him off. Then he tendered his fare and it was not received. In the morning the bed clothes were found covered with blood, and the man had been seen to leave the house in a woody condition. It is thought he went off and died.

M B Smith, traveling on foot from Portland to Pendleton, fell in with two other pedestrians, and when near Pendleton, the three took night lodgings in a barn. When Smith awoke in the morning, his fellow travelers were gone, as were also \$35 which he had in his pocket. At Pendleton, however, he found the two men intoxicated, and caused their arrest. THE OREGON PACIFIC

Only awhile ago we got our O P news from Portland and the east. Now it comes from Salem, where the live O P officials are being interviewed occasionally. The following is from the Independent:

Mr Mulcahey, of the Oregon Pacific railroad, is in Salem today and has great things to tell concerning the enterprise of the road with which he is connected. "We are now making arrangements to build over the Cascades into Eastern Oregon," he said. "What we want to do, is to run a line from Lyons to Salem. That would make this city one of the terminals. As for building past Salem to the seaboard at any future time, I do not know. It would be better for Salem to be a terminal anyway." In answer to the question as to whether they would soon make a proposition to Salem in regard to the road coming here, he said: "I think the proposition should come from Salem; we are ready to build in as soon as we feel able to do so and Salem can have the road if she will do her share. We are all ready to hear from her."

The road from Lyons to Salem will be thirty miles long and regular freight and passenger trains would connect this city directly with Eastern Oregon. We are building a large ocean warehouse at Yaquina. It will be of corrugated iron with a cement floor and cover a ground space of 150,000 feet. Grain will be loaded here for San Francisco. We can transport this grain at a lower cost than it could have been heretofore shipped to San Francisco and your farmers will get their share of the benefits. I intend going to New York on the 8th, of next month upon my return, our receiver Mr Hadley, will go. We intend to push this thing to a finish and Salem will be a big gainer."
