

MR. HARRISON'S CASE.

The letter of ex-President Harrison to the republican club convention simply showed his blind persistence in the Bourbonish belief that the people can be fooled at any time.

Mr Harrison, wrote, with the true Pecksniffian twang:

I think I may add, without transgressing the proprieties, that there is nothing in the present business situation to suggest any great gain to the country as the result of the inauguration of democratic policies.

The ex-president, of course, knows that there has been no time for the inauguration of democratic policies, except in the executive office. We are living and business is suffering under the laws passed and the conditions created and bequeathed by the republican party, with Mr Harrison's active assistance.

Was confidence impaired by our loss of treasury gold? Mr Harrison received from the democratic administration nearly \$100,000,000 above the legal reserve, and lost it all.

Have gold exports weakened the finance of the country? Under Mr Harrison's administration there was a net loss to the country of \$122,000,000.

Have the compulsory purchase of silver bullion on a falling market and the issuing of treasury notes redeemed in gold alarmed foreign investors and paralyzed credits here? This has been done under a republican law signed by Mr Harrison.

Has the wrecking of trusts added to financial distress and business uncertainty? The trusts were fostered by republican laws and enjoyed immunity under Mr Harrison's attorney-general.

It will be time enough to talk of the failure of "democratic policies" when they have been put into law and tried. Up to the present moment the only practicable democratic policy has been to stop the holes made in the ship of state by the scuttlers who were driven out on the 4th of March.

FRAUD PRACTICE

The fraternal orders of this state should hold a congress and map out their wants and then instruct the representatives to the state legislature to have laws passed protecting all fraternal bodies. One law much needed for fraternal protection is the prohibiting of any one wearing the badge of an order to which they do not belong.

MCKINLEY MUST GO

Since 1867 there has been a tariff on wool almost prohibitive in its nature. Notwithstanding this high protection the number of sheep in Ohio, which was at the time of the passage of the tariff law the largest wool growing state in the union, has been reduced to about one half. Three years ago the McKinley bill was passed increasing protection to wool and the price of wool began going down until its market selling price is more than 50 per cent less than it was immediately preceding the passage of the bill.

A repeal of all specific contract laws, and a law of congress making all money issued by the government a legal tender for any and all debts and liabilities, regardless of all specific contract laws, would restore confidence in financial circles, and would stop all speculations by bankers, brokers and money shysters, and enliven trade and make better times than any other thing that could be done, and until that is done there will be more or less uncertainty in business matters and investments of all kinds.—Mercery.

That would be difficult on account of the fact that congress, led by such men as John Sherman years ago, refunded the debt of the government, then payable in "lawful money" and made it payable in gold.
