GOOD EVENING.

M. SALARIES.—The salaries of several
Postmasters have been increased as
follows: Astoria, old salary \$2100,
new \$2200; Corvallis, old \$1600, new \$1700;
Astoria, old \$1000, new \$1100; Eugene, old
\$1000, new \$1100; Independence, old \$1000,
new \$1100; La Grande, old \$1700, new
\$1800; Marshfield, old \$1300, new \$1400;
Astoria, old \$1100, new \$1200. In Wash-
ton a big decrease is generally shown.
Aberdeen the salary has decreased \$200;
Macories, \$300; at Centralia, \$200; at
Astoria, \$200; at Ellensburg, \$100; at
Towson, \$100; at South Bend, \$300.
They have increased at Everett, Mt Vernon,
Yakima, Oakesdale, Pullman and
Homish. At Albany the receipts have
decreased considerably, but not enough to
cause the salary yet.

THE STATE'S MONEY.—Considerable has
been said about the funds for the Agricul-
tural college at Corvallis from the state.
The college has been placed in the Hamilton &
Baker building, and by the failure of that
building, becoming unavailable for the
college, and to a measure a loss. At the
meeting of the board of regents it
decided to hold the treasurer and his
damen for the money, and the matter
was placed in the hands of the executive
committee of the board. Judge Boise is
of the committee and the people will
be amply assured that justice and right
in the welfare of the state will be guarded.

THE JULY RACES.—Last Monday
the first started in the old Donaca feed
lot, owned by Mr Gilliland, which was
singly consumed; also the store and con-
sists of A F Hamilton, with a large quan-
tity of chitum bark recently gathered, and
old store building of John Ames. The

\$500, and A F Hamilton's store and con-
sists for \$2000. How the fire was started

The eagle may have screamed as usual,
and as it is obliged to do traditionally; but
it was not heard very loud in Albany.

A good many people came to this city to see
the circus, Sanger & Lents, by the way
better known as McMahon's. It did a big
business, and gave a pretty good one ring
performance. The usual number of gam-
blers and fakes were present and piled their
trade at will. In the evening, though
Sheriff Jackson took the matter in hand and
shut them out completely. One Albany
man in the morning invested \$70 in the
delusive little shell game.

A pleasant 4th of July experience was
had by the Apollo club, who with their
families, fifty-seven in all spent the day on
Mr S N Steel's place near Albany. It is
said to have been the liveliest time in the
experience of this very live club.

At Newport, The Man About Town in-
spired by a desire to hear the waves beat
against the shore went to Newport, leaving
here at 7:10 and getting there about five
hours afterwards. Though a celebration
had been advertised the only thing New-
port did that could be detected, was to fur-
nish a tub race. Three men rode around a
buoy. Two got a bath in the bay, but the
one, Ed Stinson, soaked the most, finally
won the contest. The Albany and In-
dependence clubs had been promised a good
inclosed ground for a game. The inclosure
was there; but the ground! Salad and
huckleberry bushes, summer fallow, etc
covered it; and it would take a brave man
to cross it. No diamond was laid out, and
there was not a seat on the ground. This
was poor treatment; and the club should
have been notified. After a long delay a
seven inning game was finally played on the
old ground on the edge of the Pacific, which
had plenty of salad and huckleberry bushes,
and circus rings. Albany won 2 to 1, the
condition of the ground making the score a
small one. A large number of flies were
all caught, without errors outside the di-
amond, only two inside. Cole and Reily, and
Stanley, were the battery for Albany and
Holman and Sullivan for Independence.
Time of game one hour. Welch, umpire.
The Willamette valley took 293 people and
the Philomath band over the bar, and a
glorious time was reported. Four car loads
of people left Yaquina on the return trip at
8:30. For several miles the air was con-
vulsed with Salvation army songs by the
Philomath people, comic songs by Johnson
and others, and a general hallalalulah; but
this gradually ceased and the cars were soon
filled with dozing, quiet people. It was 1
o'clock when Albany was reached.

At Harrisburg—The biggest crowd prob-
ably ever in Harrisburg did justice to
American liberty. Rev Driver delivered
the address, a rattling effort. The usual
small contests were had. In the evening
the calaboose had several drunks in it when
they succeeded in tearing it down, and es-
caping.

At Lyons—A live time was experienced
by a good sized crowd. There were several
small contests like foot races, jumping, etc.
A feature of the day was the ball game be-
tween the Willamettes, of this city, and the
Fox Valley club. Albany won with ease.
Score 17 to 11. N M Newport delivered
the oration, a polished and brilliant effort,
and a maiden one of the kind.

At Corvallis, it was claimed 10,000 peo-
ple participated. John Barrett, of Port-
land, orated.

At Lebanon a big crowd jollified. The
celebration was a success. The oration by
James J Charlton, was one of great merit,
and was highly enjoyed. The usual hol-
iday features made the day a live one.

At Solaville the fountain was about
emptied. This is a delightful place for a
celebration, and people took advantage of
it from all parts of the country.

At Brownsville a big picnic was held.
Rev Hoberg and others gave short talks.
