MULTUM IN PARVO.

If there is a man in this nation, of prominence in political life, who can afford to rest upon his laurels and enjoy the present financial situation from a personal standpoint, that man is our late honored chief magistrate, Benjamin Harrison, of Indiana. While he is a patriotic and public spirited man, he would be more than human did he not enjoy in a sense the results of the change from the sound industrial and financial policy on which his administration stood to the uncertain policy of his successor, full of vague hints of radical revision which the democratic congress hesitates to inaugurate; of an income tax to which nine-tenths of those who have incomes in excess of the proposed standard are opposed, and of the free coinage of silver upon which the democratic party and its chief advisers are divided and perplexed. Having brought the country to a degree of prosperity never before attained, President Harrison and his advisers were discredited by the very people who reaped the greatest benefit, the so-called "labor voters." He can afford to look on serenely while his successor sweats and worries at the helm striving blindly to map out a course by which the good old ship of state, heavily laboring in the financial breakers into which she was betrayed by a sudden change of steersman last November, may reach again the smooth sea of prosperity. It is seldom that a president seeking a re-election and meeting defeat is so thoroughly vindicated by events in so short a space of time, and the country, while deploring its own condition, may well congratulate the ex-president and his chief advisers of the late administration.—Oregonian.

If there ever was a case where the Oregonian succeeded in putting much slush in little space it is in the article above quoted from its columns. So, Harrison can rest upon his laurels can he? Well, what are his laurels? They are to be found in the present financial condition of the country growing out of the Sherman silver law and the McKinley tariff law, both passed during his administration, and both of which were approved by him. What democratic congress has been in session during Cleveland's present administration that the Oregonian should say that it hesitates to inaugurate tariff revision? Shame on such open falsification. So Harrison brought the country to a high degree of prosperity, did he? And how did he do it? Was it by finding a \$100,000,000 surplus in the treasury when he entered the presidential office and leaving an empty treasury when the people retired him? These are magnificent laurels, indeed. So he has been vindicated, has he? Yes, we are now reaping the whirlwind as the necessary harvest springing from the evils of Sherman and McKinley laws which he helped to sow. He can look on serenely at the dire consequences of the vicious legislation of his own administration, can he? So likewise did Nero whistle while Rome burned. The public are not all fools. The Oregonian may succeed in fooling of the people some times, and part of the people all the time, but its editor is entirely too finite in his cranium to fool all the people all the time. The people, (the intelligent part of them,) know whom to hold responsible for the vicious revenue and financial system that has brought stagnation upon the country.
