A FIERCE DEMOCRAT.

In all these United States there are, it is said, but three women who own, publish and edit political newspapers. One of the three is Mrs. Mary Virginia Proctor of Lebanon, Ohio, editor, proprietor and business manager of the Lebanon Patriot, the democratic organ of Warren county. It is an ambitious and politically ardent journal published in a strong republican county, the former home of Tom Corwin, Bishop Soule, Gen Burnside, Justice McLean, Gen Mitchell and many other men of eminence. Upon the death of her husband, who was editor of the paper, Mrs. Proctor was inclined to sell the Patriot, but found she could do so only at a loss. As it was on a paying basis, she determined to continue in full charge, and within the first year of her absolute control she increased the circulation and took a well earned place among the editors of the state. She is earnest, extremely practical in business and politics, not hesitating to use her editorial columns in the defence of her party and in the vigorous denunciation of the enemy both in national and local campaigns. While not assuming literary pretensions, she has a clear forcible style, not unmingled with keen sarcasm and incisive thrusts in her political writings. She has a very comfortable and valuable home at Lebanon. The Patriot pays well and she is a stockholder in a local bank there.

The pension bureau has notified a great many pensioners throughout the entire country, who are drawing pensions under the act of June 27, 1890, known as the independent pension act, that payment of their pensions will be suspended for 60 days, during which time they are required to show cause why they should continue to draw pensions. This action is pursuant to the recent ruling of Secretary Smith, that a pensioner under the act of June 27, 1890, drawing a pension for total disability, must be shown to be physically incapable of manual labor. It is estimated at the pension office, although the work has recently begun, that something over 1000 suspensions have already been made. It would appear from this that the administration really means to make vigorous efforts to rid the pension rolls of the very many fraudulent names placed thereon. The people will endorse this move, and no honest pensioner can object.

The "unwise laws" to which the president alludes are not those alone which deal with the purchase of silver. The whole money question will have to be considered, and with it the tariff legislation that has largely contributed to bringing the business interests of the country into "the present perilous condition." To deal with these inter-related subjects of the currency and the tariff will tax the wisdom and patriotism of congress to the utmost. While the democratic party will be responsible for whatever is done, the probabilities are that strict regard will not be paid to party lines in arranging the details, whatever may be the case on the final vote.

Many questions are asked as to the action of the two parties in congress at the time of the passage of the Sherman silver law. The vote in the house shows 122 republicans and no democrats voting for the bill, and 90 democrats and no republicans voting against it. There was one republican and fifteen democrats that did not vote. In the senate there were thirty-nine votes, (all republicans,) in favor of the bill, and twenty-six votes, (all democrats,) against the bill. Three democrats did not vote.

Congressman Denton McMinn, of Tennessee, who will be leader of the democratic majority in the house of representatives during the next congress, says "There is no doubt that congress will wipe out every vestige of the election laws framed during the reconstruction days, so called; the entire management of elections will be given to the state, where it belongs. There will be no more federal supervisors and United States marshals at the polls."

At the quarterly payments of pensions there last week 125 pensioners were dropped from the rolls in accordance with orders from Washington. It is the intention of the Grand Army posts to test the matter in the courts, and Congressman William A Stone has been selected as counsel.

Vice-President and Mrs Stevenson have started on a tour. They go first to Chicago, thence to Salt Lake city and thence to San Francisco. After a brief stay there they will go to Portland. They will return early in August. A few days later they will go to Washington to remain during the special session.

Robert A. Miller, of Jacksonville, Ore., was appointed Register for the land office at Oregon City by President Cleveland on June 30. J T Apperson will have to step down and out from his bonanza job, and the newspaper men wont have to make a "divvy" for the "benefit of the poor settlers." Tillamook Advocate.
