GOOD EVENING.

CAP HUMPHREY'S CONDITION.—Last evening's Pendleton E.O. says: Late unfor-
tunate symptoms have occasioned the fear
among Cap. Humphrey's friends that he
cannot survive the affliction of which he
was lately the victim. Last night he was
restless and delirious, and no sleep came
to relieve him. His cries awakened nearly
everyone in the vicinity, and his attendants
were worn out in their efforts to calm him
in bed. This morning he had quieted down
somewhat, although the condition of de-
lirium remained. During the entire night
his friends, T. Steuben, and J. C. Misset,
and nurse, James H. Harnish, watched nonstop-
ingly at his bedside. From his physicians a
more encouraging report was obtained con-
cerning the captain. They state that his
pulse is fairly good, his temperature nor-
mal, and that the limb appears to be heal-
ing rapidly. They do not think that there
is occasion for any alarm, and believe his
mental disquietude will prove but tempo-
rary.

THE SAME CELESTIAL.—The following
from the Eugene Guard tells of a Celestial
who resided in Albany at one time for a
year or more, and whose presence is an eye
to any city: A rumor has been in cir-
culation that a case of leprosy existed in
Albany. In answer to a telegram
asking for particulars we received the fol-
lowing answer: "I will state that I am
unable to find a single person who has even
heard of a case of leprosy in this place. A
strange Chinaman got off the train here
Saturday. He had a won on the back of
his neck as large as an average size coc-
card. The rumor must have started from
this. The heathen should be run out of
town on general principles."

OUR STATE FLOWER is not to be sneezed
at. The following suggests that while we
were at it the apple blossom should have
been made the state flower. The Hillsboro
Independent says: Mr. T. B. Perkins, of
this county, has in his possession a section
from the stem of the Oregon grape (Berberis
aquifolium) which is remarkable for its
size, it being nine inches in diameter. The
plant is classed among the shrubs, indeed
it is a tree shrub, but the specimen found by
Mr. Perkins has grown to a dignity of a
tree. The flower of the Berberis aquifolium
is what has been selected for the state flower.

MILTON HALE INJURED.—This morning
Mr. Milton Hale, one of Albany's oldest
residents, was going through a narrow pas-
sage in his barn, in the suburbs of the city,
followed by two or three cows, when one
jumped against another one, and on account
of the narrowness of the place pushed Mr.
Hale violently against the side of the barn,
breaking two ribs, bruising his shoulder and
injuring him internally, just how seriously
will not be known for a day or two. Dr.
Mason was called and attended him, and he
is doing as well as can be expected this
evening.

DEPENDENT HIS MOTHER.—News was re-
ceived at The Dalles Saturday from a set-
tlement near that place, called Ten Mile,
of the killing of a man named E. W. Wilhelm,
by his 22-year-old son, William. Wilhelm
was a man 55 years old, who had not been
living with his family for some time. Yester-
day he returned home and quarreled with
his wife and reached for a gun to shoot her.
The boy, seeing their lives in danger, struck
him father on the head with a club, killing
him instantly. He went to The Dalles
Saturday morning and gave himself up to
the sheriff, who, with the coroner, has re-
turned to the scene of the tragedy.

VERY HIGH BIDDING.—There must be a
big demand for money in Salem according
to the following from the Statesman: The
adjoined meeting of the directors of the
Salem Building and Loan association was
held at the office of the secretary last even-
ing, at which all withdrawals were paid in
full, and only one new notice of withdrawal
presented. Two thousand dollars was
received at 125 months, \$100 at eighty, and
\$400 at seventy-six. The one at 125 months
inferred in advance was the high water
for this association since its organization
four years ago the first of next November.

NEW P. M.'S.—The following postmasters
were appointed yesterday in Oregon: Brown-
ville, Linn county, F. M. Jack; Gas-
ton, Washington county, C. W. Hudson;
Monmouth, Polk county, J. J. Higgins; Ne-
halam, Tillamook county, C. S. Robbins;
Stanton, Marion county, J. H. Barnard. The
total number of fourth-class postmasters
appointed today was 99, of which 33 were
to fill vacancies caused by resignation and
death.

deputy for the district extending from
Portland south to Roseburg.

Mr. A. J. Shanks, writing from Rosalia,
Washington, says that a greater wheat
crop will be harvested there this year than
was harvested the great wheat blockade
year, 1890.

Mr. Nivens, manager of the famous
White Swan mine, deposited \$5000 in bul-
lion at the Baker City National bank, the
result of a ten day's run, or \$500 per day.

On July 10th the Oregon Pacific boats
will all be tied up for the summer, owing
to the lowness of the water, and the river
office will be closed until traffic begins
again.

The fish ladder at Oregon City is await-
ing a visit to the coast from Fish Commis-
sioner McDonald, whose opinion will be
sought in the matter, before any steps are
taken.

It may be quiet, but everything is not
stationary. Last night the Russ House
had sixty-four guests, everything being
full and the clerk reports a large patron-
age continually.

\$357.

Justice Newport rendered his decree to-
day in the case of the State against Zeph-
eriah, for obstructing the river at Niagara,
by displacing the indictment, which was
against him individually, whereas he was
only the president of a corporation.

This morning Mr. Mirandi, proprietor of
the Pioneer house, arose at the sound of
his alarm clock, and went out to attend to
his horses. While gone someone entered
the house and stole the clock. Some
campers were suspected. Besides the
above a noose was stolen from Dr. Mas-
ton's yard, and about \$8 from a person at
the Delmonico restaurant.

An Oregon City dispatch says: Town-
ship to south, range 5 east, in the Santiam
district of Linn county, on the Oregon
Pacific railroad, was opened yesterday for
settlement. The office was besieged early
this morning by nearly a hundred appli-
cants. This township is reported to be
very heavily timbered and of a soil which
will prove very productive under cultiva-
tion.

F. A. Turner broke twenty-four out of
twenty-five blue rocks at the shoot of the
Salem Rod and Gun club at Morningside
shooting grounds yesterday. B. W. Har-
ritt and C. D. Gabrielson each broke twenty-
two, and J. Ryan nineteen. The contest
was for the silver medal. Mr. Turner has
won it five times, and Mr. Harritt seven.
Whenever a contestant secures this medal
eight times it becomes his permanent
property.—Statesman.

A German named Woll, who has just
returned from the United States of Col-
umbia, tells a horrible tale of suffering
and wrong. He said that last March he
and about 250 others were engaged in
work on the Magdalen & Carthagen rail-
road in Columbia. When they got to the
place they found the land swampy and
many of them were soon ill with yellow
fever and other diseases. The company
gave them no medical aid and they had
to take care of each other. When they
asked to be sent back to their country they
were told that they had not kept their con-
tract. Woll says that over 100 of the men
died in a short time and that of the entire
number only 65 lived to return north.—

WEATHER BUREAU

Crop weather bulletin, No. 16, of the
Oregon State Weather Service, for the week
ending Tuesday, July 11th, 1893, J. B.
Rague, local forecast official.

The temperature continues to remain cool,
and much below the average. It is seldom
that the maximum temperature rises above
75 degrees. Partly cloudy to cloudy weather
has prevailed, with several general rain
showers.

The rains were of great benefit to the
cereal and fruit crops, but detrimental to
the hay which is now in progress. Clover
hay is very heavy, timothy is not so
heavy, but is a good average. The cheat
hay is a good crop in many localities. The
rains and cloudy weather prevents the
proper curing of the hay. The fall wheat
is very heavy and is falling down in places;
it will be a good average crop. Spring
wheat will be a full average crop. Oats
are reported to be a fine crop in every coun-
ty. Corn has slow growth. It needs warmer
weather. Hops are growing. There is a
marked absence of hop lice. The reports
concerning the fruit crop are not encourag-
ing. The heavy rains during the time the
fruit was in blossom did most of the injury
and late frosts materially assisted in cutting
down the yield. Then too many of the
orchards are not properly attended to, the
old pioneer orchard lacks spraying and
proper cultivation. Many of the corres-
pondents report some orchards as good
crops, others no crop. Prunes and plums
are the only fruit crop, save berries, which
are reported to be an average crop and even
these in sections are not up to the average;
generally speaking they will be an average
yield.

In Eastern Oregon, cloudy to partly cloudy
weather has continued; there has been a
marked absence of any real warm weather
so far this season. Frosts are frequent in
Crook, Klamath and Lake counties. A gen-
eral rain occurred on the 8th and 9th. The
grain crop has been greatly benefited by
the rains. Fields which ten days ago did
not promise over 10 or 15 bushels per acre
or not hardly suitable for hay, have revived,
new growth has started and the heads are
filling nicely. The fruit crop is no better
than it is in the western portions of the
state. Insects are marked by their absence,
though in Wasco county a few codlin moths
are to be observed; in Umatilla the green
aphid and codlin moth are quite injurious;
in Klamath the green aphid has done dam-
age to some of the fruit trees. As in West-
ern Oregon the cool weather abates the de-
velopment of the fruit pests.

A CIRCUS FIGHT.—The thieves running
Sanger & Lents circus met their match in
Chehalis yesterday. A dispatch says: One
of the fire-flamers accompanying Sanger
& Lents' show beat a German farmer out
of \$20 by means of the short-change racket.
The German swore out a warrant for his
arrest, which was put into the hands of
Deputy Sheriff Ed Barnett to serve. Bar-
nett went to the show train while the
outfit was packing up after the perfor-
mance and arrested his man. As he
was leaving with him, employees of the
show, headed by the manager, assailed
him together with two other officers, beat
him senseless and rescued the prisoner.
At this juncture Sheriff Barnett, accompa-
nied by Deputy Carpenter, arrived on the
scene with drawn revolvers and proceeded
to search the show train for the short-
change sharp. They were unable to find
him, but arrested four employees of the show.
The manager in the meantime escaped to
the hotel and had gone to bed. They
hunted him up, got him out of bed and took
him with his hired men to the county jail.
The five prisoners were charged with as-
saulting the officers, and were to have had
a hearing this morning, but it was post-
poned till Wednesday. The show proceed-
ed to Olympia without a manager and sev-
eral specialty artists. The manager was re-
leased on bail this afternoon, furnished on a
telegram from the Oregon National bank of
Portland.
