STRAINING AT A GNAT

The Beaverton Chronicle is muchly wrought up. It is scandalized. It's indignation knows no bounds. Scarcely a doubt that it could blte a tenpenny nail in two. And all about an appointment made by Cleveland. Judge A W Terrell of Texas is said to be a poet and wrote some verses about Wilkes Booth who killed Lincoln. Cleveland has appointed him to fill the office of minister to Turkey. The Caronicle thinks the "poem must have made a wonderful impression on the mind of Mr Cleve-land." It thinks "the wonder is that this long eared Texas judge, with the lofty poetic soul, was not taken into the cabinet or put in charge of the pensionibureau." Now we believe that nine-tenths of the rational. candid men of the land believe, that, politically, it is a much greater crime for one to do all in his power to destroy the government than to rejoice in the killing of a president. The Chronicle should run its mind back and search out a few historical facts. One, Gen Ackerman, a Georgia confederate, did all in his power to destroy this government. When Lee surrendered it left Ackerman a soldier, without a job-Being a dear lover of pelf and power he at once joined himself to the republican party for where the carrion is there also will be the crow, or, literally, where the spoils of office are there will be found the spoils hunter. Ile at once became an important factor in republica ppolitics of that day and it is no "wonder" that Grant made him attorney general in his cabinet. The same fact might be mentioned about Keys whom Hayes made postmaster-general in his cabinet, and about Moseby, the confed erate guerrilla, who was given a foreign mission by a republican president, or Billy Mahone, with whom republican leaders so long connubiated. Holding a session of congress in hot weather is perhaps a good idea. There will be no trifling with public interests or dila tory motions to delay legislation if the thermometer stands where it usually does in Washington during August and Sep-The uncomfortableness of the weather has more than once hurried legis lation so that representatives might rejoice themselves in cooler climes. But congress ought to know that it is not chosen to enjoy or amuse itself, but to serve the publie. In the country farmers are used to doing muck of their hard work when the thermometer is uncomfortably high, and what they do they expect their representatives not to shirk.

A flat car costs about \$350, a flat-bottom coal car \$475, a gondola drop bottom \$500, a double-hopper bottom ccal car 8525, a double-hopper bottom coke car \$540, a bex ear \$600, a stock car \$550, a fruit car (ventilated) \$700 and a refrigerator car \$500. Not many people know how much material enters into the computtion of a first class passenger car. To build a passenger car of the best kind requires about 2400 feet of poplar, 3400 feet of ash, 1000 feet of white pine and 2300 feet of yellow pine, 500 feet of the best oak, 400 feet of the trongest hickory, 400 feet of cherry, 400 feet of maple veneer, and perhaps small amounts of other woods. There are four pairs of wheels and axles, two pairs of passenger-ear trucks, about 2000 pounds of from 700 pounds of castings, 300 pounds of galvanized from and 250 streets of tin. But before the car is put on the road about \$1200 will be expended in labor.


