STRAINING AT A GNAT

The Beaverton Chronicle is muchly wrought up. It is scandalized. Its indignation knows no bounds. Scarcely a doubt that it could bite a tempest in two. And all about an appointment made by Cleveland. Judge A W Terrell of Texas is said to be a poet and wrote some verses about Wilkes Booth who killed Lincoln. Cleveland has appointed him to fill the office of minister to Turkey. The Chronicle thinks the "poem must have made a wonderful impression on the mind of Mr Cleveland." It thinks "the wonder is that this long eared Texas judge, with the lofty poetic soul, was not taken into the cabinet or put in charge of the pension bureau." Now we believe that nine-tenths of the rational, candid men of the land believe, that, politically, it is a much greater crime for one to do all in his power to destroy the government than to rejoice in the killing of a president. The Chronicle should run its mind back and search out a few historical facts. One, Gen Ackerman, a Georgia confederate, did all in his power to destroy this government. When Lee surrendered he left Ackerman a soldier, without a job. Being a dear lover of pell and power, he at once joined himself to the republican party for where the carrion is there also will be the crow, or, literally, where the spoils of office are there will be found the spoils hunter. He at once became an important factor in republica politics of that day, and it is no "wonder" that Grant made him attorney general in his cabinet. The same fact might be mentioned about Keys whom Hayes made postmaster-general in his cabinet, and about Moseby, the confederate guerrilla, who was given a foreign mission by a republican president, or Billy Mahone, with whom republican leaders so long connubated. The Chronicle wonders that Terrell was not put into Cleveland's cabinet. Terrell, if a spoils hunter, now sees that he made the mistake of his life in not becoming a republican at the close of the war for then he would have had a chance of being called to Grant's or Hayes's cabinet, but being a democrat he has to put up with the insignificant mission to Turkey. We commiserate the Chronicle. In due time it will learn the patent truth that a confederate general in the late rebellion is not now necessarily a better man because he is a republican nor necessarily a worse man because he is a democrat. It is a foolish thing to strain at a gnat and swallow a camel.

THE HOT-WATER REMEDY.

Are you a busy, worried woman, who comes home at night with temples throbbing and every muscle aching from fatigue? If so, you often say to yourself: "I am dead tired, and I haven't the ambition to dress or even comb my hair for the evening." Then you lounge about and go to bed about 9 o'clock with your head still aching and your limbs just as tired as when you came in. The next time you feel that way just slip off the waist of your gown, brush your hair up on the top of your head, and bathe the back of your neck with hot water. When the pain is a little relieved wash your face with the same reviver, and by the time that is done you will feel like brushing your hair and fixing up a bit, or we are very much mistaken.

Holding a session of congress in hot weather is perhaps a good idea. There will be no trifling with public interests or ditatory motions to delay legislation if the thermometer stands where it usually does in Washington during August and September. The uncomfortableness of the weather has more than once hurried legislation so that representatives might rejoice themselves in cooler climes. But congress ought to know that it is not chosen to enjoy or amuse itself, but to serve the public. In the country farmers are used to doing much of their hard work when the thermometer is uncomfortably high, and what they do they expect their representatives not to shirk.

A flat car costs about \$380, a flat-bottom coal car \$475, a gondola drop bottom \$500, a double-hopper bottom coal car \$525, a double-hopper bottom coke car \$540, a box car \$600, a stock car \$550, a fruit car (ventilated) \$700 and a refrigerator car \$800. A four-wheeled caboose costs \$550, and an eight-wheeled one \$700. The prices given on the above cars include power brakes and verifire-plate cuplers. A 50 foot mail and baggage car \$3500, a second-class coach \$4800, first-class coach \$5500, while a first-class Pullman car costs \$15,000.

The old custom of ringing the curfew has been reinstated in the villages and towns of Canada, in accordance with an act passed at the last session of parliament. It requires that all children under 17 shall be off the street at 9 o'clock, the hour of the ringing of the curfew.

Chemically treated, one pound of coal will make enough magenta to color 500 yards of flannel, vermilion for 2500 yards, orange for 120 yards, and alizarine sufficient for 150 yards of cloth.

Not many people know how much material enters into the composition of a first-class passenger car. To build a passenger car of the best kind requires about 2400 feet of poplar, 3500 feet of ash, 1000 feet of white pine and 2300 feet of yellow pine, 500 feet of the best oak, 400 feet of the strongest hickory, 400 feet of cherry, 400 feet of maple veneer, and perhaps small amounts of other woods. There are four pairs of wheels and axles, two pairs of passenger-car trucks, about 3000 pounds of iron, 700 pounds of castings, 300 pounds of galvanized iron and 250 sheets of tin. Then add screws, chandeliers, air brakes, sash balances, 63 or 70 glass panes for the windows and doors, stoves, seat fixtures, lamps, door locks, knobs and hinges, basket racks, window lifts, window fasteners and seat springs, and you have most of the hardware. Then there are about 200 yards of plush, one hundred yards of sheeting and 300 pounds of hair. When all these things are taken into account no wonder can be felt that a passenger coach costs over \$4000. The materials do not cost this much. But before the car is put on the road about \$1200 will be expended in labor.

The Jacksonville Times says: There will be more fruit in southern Oregon than in any other portion of the state this year; in fact, there will be an abundance of nearly every description, and of a first class quality, too. This is pre-eminently a fruit country, and sooner or later will take front rank with the leading districts of California in the race for public favor. The time is not far off when Rogue river valley fruit will have a prominent place on the tables of the nabobs of the United States.

It will be remembered that when Booth was playing "Richard" in Chicago in 1879 a mentally unbalanced spectator named Gray shot at the actor twice from the gallery. One of the bullets Mr Booth secured and had it set in a gold cartridge, upon which he had engraved the words: "From Mark Gray to Edwin Booth, April 23, 1879." This grim reminder he always preserved.

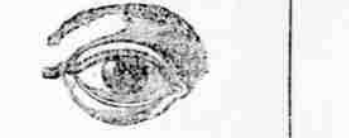
