THE SHERIFF OF LAKE COUNTY.—The Farmers Alliance committee of Lane county have been examining into Sheriff Land's accounts with the county of late, and make a long and severe report, giving samples of his charges, and mandating that the prosecuting attorney proceed against the sheriff under section 16 of the code, and also sue him under section 2378 for failing to return the secretary of state his emolument point. The following in the report will indicate that the office is an asphyxiated one the way run: We, the committee, also find that the sheriff, J. E. Land, has received from the county the following sums of money for his pretended services as sheriff since January 1st, 1893: January, \$51.10; March, \$6.07; April, \$357.58; May, \$385.37; June, \$682.61; total, \$857.73. And that he now has a claim before the court for consideration, amounting to \$73.09, making a total amount allowed claimed for his services of \$10,831.42. In addition to this he has received as large amounts as fees for services in litigants in civil cases. And your committee further find that the sheriff retained in his possession thousands of dollars collected for taxes beyond the amount allowed by sec 2797.

ARRESTED FOR TRESPASS.—A novel case on trial in Justice Davis' court yesterday afternoon. It was novel on account of the youth of the prisoner, who is a Charlie Campbell, aged thirteen, a son of the popular drayman, Alexander Campbell. The little fellow's offense was alleged trespass, and it was committed last week when he and a companion named Marvin Brandeberry, of about the same number of summers, passed in the boundary lines of the farm of R. C. H. while out blackberrying. After being patiently to the evidence, the court burst into a fit of laughter, and the wisdom of the court, the jury simply returned a verdict of "not guilty."—Corvallis Times.

GAME LAW.—Under the new game law deer can now be killed, but does not get killed until after August 1st. It is unlawful to kill any deer any time unless the carcass is used or served by the person killing it, or is for food. Elk can be killed from just last to December 1st. Ducks can be killed until after September 1st. Geese, pheasants, quail and partridges can be killed from August 1st to November 1st. Trout cannot be sold or served for sale any time except during the months of September and October.

THE ASSISTANT CHIEF FOUND GUILTY.—At evening the trial of Charles Metzgar, assistant Chief Engineer, for using profane and abusive language while on duty, concluded before the board of fire judges as a court and jury. Carl and Wiley and J. R. Wyatt pleaded eloquently in defense, while Hon. W. R. Bilyeu made matters lively for the prosecution. The board after consultation found the defendant guilty as charged, and he was formally reprimanded by the President of the board, Mr. David Link. The case excited general interest.

A NEW PROGRAM.—It is quite probable that within a short time a new time table will be adopted, under which the Lebanon train will run directly to Natron, on the Oregonian R. R., while the Woodburn train will run to Lebanon, the two trains meeting at the junction, where passengers will be transferred. This will save a crew of men.

NEW YORK LETTER.

New York, July 14th, 1893.
"The great Paris Exposition of 1889 was not comparable in any respect with your World's Fair in Chicago," said General Digby Willoughby of London, the other day. The general had charge of 200 British soldiers whom he brought over to entertain the visitors of the English headquarters. Regarding the western metropolis itself the general said, "New York is far ahead of Chicago so far as the condition of the streets and general cleanliness are concerned."

It is certainly gratifying to learn by cable that Augustin Daly's company of comedians scored such a remarkable success in London. The opening of Mr. Daly's theatre in Leicester Square London, was a great event among the professional people of that city. Formerly American players have been received with cordiality by the critics and theatre-goers of London. But the company scored an instantaneous success at this performance of "The Taming of the Shrew" before a distinguished audience among whom were Thos. F. Bayard, United States Ambassador; Patrick Collins United States Consul General; Mr. and Mrs. Wm. W. Astor, Mr. and Mrs. Bradley Maroin, Mrs. Mackey, George Gould, Earl and Countess of Craven, Lord and Lady Salisbury, Sir Arthur Sullivan, and the Lord Mayor and the Lady Mayoress. The house was beautifully decorated with flags and bunting, the American flag predominating. After the last curtain, the audience rose and cheered and applauded so heartily that Mr. Daly answered the calls and made a pleasing speech. The success achieved by such favorites as Ada Rehan, James Lewis, Creston Clarke, Mrs. Gilbert, Sidney Auerbert, Isabella Irving, and Kitty Cheatham is certainly very flattering since it comes from the critical and often severe English metropolis.

Some time ago one of New York's enterprising theatrical managers brought a man from London who was billed as "Sandow," the strongest man on earth. Sandow, of course received the usual notoriety given to European attractions, of his kind by the Sunday papers. Last Saturday night as Sandow left the Casino, where he has been demonstrating his abilities as a modern Hercules, he was attacked by a woman known as "Lurline, the Water Queen." After soundly horsewhipping the strong man the freak was arrested and held for trial. But why should a man of Sandow's great strength fear a modest dame museum freak like the water queen? Calling at police headquarters the other day Sandow spent half an hour closeted with Inspector McLaughlin. When he left the latter's office he was in company with Detective Heidelberg. Of course Sandow was surprised to hear that it was rumored about, to the effect of his securing police protection from the gentle "Lurline." Inspector McLaughlin would not discuss the matter and it appears as if the strong man's movements were prepared in advance for advertising purposes.

At last the fare to Chicago has been reduced. The move was inaugurated at a meeting of the Presidents of the several trunk lines. It was decided that special excursion trains will be run to Chicago and return, composed of day cars only, and to make the run in thirty hours for the fare of one way on regular trains. No stop overs are allowed and tickets are good for ten days only. This move makes the fare to the World's fair very cheap and for \$17 a ticket can be purchased on some roads and \$20 on others. This action on the part of the railroad companies is in accordance with the popular demand.

Manager Ward has signed a new battery for the New York team. Pitcher, German and catcher, Park Wilson both from the Augusta, Ga. team. Both men are highly recommended. Wilson comes from the west, having played with the Portland, Oregon team and also in Oakland. It is hoped that the new twiler will strengthen the Giant's in their weakest point. "The Sun" printed a story to the effect that John Ward was to be disposed of by the New York baseball club. The article was untrue and without foundation and was written by some rival of the brilliant and popular captain and manager.
