THE SPOILS SEESAW.

A republican organ in Philadelphia, noting the changes in fourth-class post-offices, says:

Seriously, how utterly silly the whole business is! Why should 49,000 country postmasters be bounced out of office simply because there has been a change in the presidency of the United States? The people are only interested in having their mail matter properly handled, and the average country postmaster has precious little to do with forming or directing public sentiment.

These are fine sentiments, but we do not remember that the Philadelphia Telegraph enforced them upon the administration of President Harrison four years ago.

From statistics recently published it appears that there were 4,234 more fourth class postmasters appointed on removals during the first four months of the Harrison administration than have been appointed for the same reason during the first four months of the present administration.

No democrats had held post-offices for twenty-five years when that party came into power in 1885. Under Mr Cleveland a good many were naturally appointed. But when President Harrison succeeded, in 1889, instead of improving his "fine chances" to departisanize the postal service by leaving good men in office irrespective of politics, that executive, with the able and willing assistance of Headman Clarkson proceeded to make a clean sweep.

The policy of the present postmaster-general is to remove incumbents of fourth class postoffices only after they have served for four years, and then to appoint democrats. This is a moderation of the old practice. And yet, as the law fixes no term for the minor postmasters, the application of the four-year rule is simply a regulation of the old spoils rule of "rotation in office."

INTERESTING FACTS.

An official order by Pension Commissioner Lochren will require applicants for pensions to furnish a full military and medical history of their services and disabilities. Is it not strange that such a condition has not been required before? That applications of pensions should be acted upon or even considered without this reasonable safeguard shows how loosely the affairs of the pension bureau have been conducted.

Another official statement shows that during the first three months of the present democratic administration 13,606 original pensions have been granted. Yet there are those who pretend to believe that President Cleveland cherishes a feeling of antipathy towards the soldiers, and that deserving pensioners will be unfairly treated in consequence of that feeling.

The democratic party believes in dealing justly with the soldiers, but it also believes in dealing justly with the people. Liberal pensions must be paid to the disabled and to the widows of soldiers. But the expense should stop here. The pension rolls must be purged of impostors, of men who are able to earn their own livelihood, and, most of all, of that class of shameless beggars who with large fortunes are yet willing to eat the bread of charity.

At funerals in the city of Mexico no hearses are used. The street-railway company has a monopoly of the funeral business. It runs funeral cars, white for children, black for adults, and mourners follow to the cemetery in a richly upholstered special car.

In Dutch Guiana the women carry upon their persons all the family savings in the shape of heavy bracelets, anklets, necklaces, and even crowns of gold and silver. Weighty earrings, and huge rings, six or eight inches in diameter, dangle from their noses.

Among the foes with which a free people must ever contend are these: The heartless capitalist who is concerned only for his own material advancement; the labor demagogue who never did an honest day's work in his life, who makes a living by stirring up strife between workmen and employers, and who is happiest when his dupes are most miserable; the practical politician who cares nothing for principle, who believes that every man has his price and who annually spends thousands in debauching individual voters; the citizen who estimates his ballot from a commercial standpoint, and who is willing to sell it to the highest bidder, just as he would a bushel of wheat or a ton of coal. These all exist among us today, but they are neither so numerous nor so strong as some suppose, and they grow feebler with each passing year.

Senator Chandler's penchant for information was rewarded by a reply in the New York World which it seems ought to be satisfactory to New Hampshire, a Senator. He asked:

Why should not the banks, the Chamber of Commerce and the newspapers denounce and state the exact truth: That the present distressed condition of the business of the country is due to the approaching assault upon the McKinley bill in particular and upon the American protective system in general?

The World replies that it is because the people referred to are not mostly fools, and none but fools would be thrown into a panic at the prospect of a reduction of taxation at their own repeated demand. That reply is clear and complete.
