Two hundred empty beer barrels, for re-shipment to the breweries, were piled up in front of a saloon in Pendleton the other day, representing the amount of beer consumed at that saloon in two months. Each barrel holds fifteen gallons, making the total for the five hundred of 7,500 gallons, nearly two a piece for every man, and child in that city. The first cost of the beer was about \$2,000.

The following from the Eugene Guard is very curious: A pedler went over town recently selling a patent article. Among the many who purchased was the wife of a merchant. One day when he went home to dinner his wife informed him what a nice thing she had bought. She then learned her husband had them in his store for sale for a year, at half the price she paid for hers. When told of this she said: "Well, why don't you advertise them. Nobody knows it."

It is estimated 10,000 idle men are in Denver, and 20,000 in towns of Colorado, half of whom are making their way here to become a public charge. To avoid this, commercial bodies will ask railroads to make a five dollar rate to the Missouri river for this class, in the expectation that they will be able to get work on farms. It is estimated Colorado, Utah, Montana, and New Mexico merchants have countermanded orders for goods in New York to amount of over \$12,000,000.
