

THE BROWNVILLE LAND CASE.—Hon J. Weatherford and O. P. Coshaw returned from Oregon City where they had been to investigate the claim of Monk filed in 1878 in North Brownville. It was found that Monk had stated that the land was outside the city limits, whereas it was inside the limits, and a certain law provided for the filing of a claim inside of any incorporated limits. A new filing was made Monday morning changing the original in a few details. Monk, it seems, is only an agent of the Oregon City lawyers, and Draper, for whom he is undoubtedly the plan is to get several thousand acres on a compromise with the present owner of the property; but this will fail, and the title will be in favor of the state, as to a result in favor of the state nominal owners. The property is worth about \$50,000. On it is the new P. Hall, Dymons store and P. O., and a hop and about twenty five residences. Coshaw owns 50 acres of the land. The title to the title was caused in a mixed up way. Originally the property was sold as land, but the state had no title. A named Benjamin filed upon it as a claim, but never perfected his title. A 1878 was thought to be one of the old ones belonging to the O & C R R. and was by the railroad to Wm. McHargue, who claim the present title came. The title claim to it by the Oregon City lawyers, namely Monk, comes from the title claim never having been perfected by the old law, which is different from present one. The claim confers no title on the parties pushing it. A statement of the facts is sufficient comment.

DOUBLE EXPERIENCE.—The Harris-Courier gives an extended account of the wife of Mr. Ed Hearn, of that city, who had been left for her former husband in the East. The Courier says: "Her marriage, which took place at the home of Mr. Hearn's parents in Milford, August 18, 1892, was a somewhat romantic affair, having never seen each other prior to their wedding day. This is Mr. Hearn's second marriage, the first having been just as disastrously as the second, and altogether unsimilar, it is said. If it is not enough to convince him that marriage failure must be a very tenacious pursuit, the DEMOCRAT man who has heard of the former affair, wagers the wife showed good judgment in returning to her former home."

SENT TO THE DEPOSITORY.—Yesterday post \$11,000 was shipped by Receiver Hall, of the Linn County National Bank to the U. S. depository in Portland, the First National Bank, as required by law. All a money received has to go to the depository. The depositories of the bank will receive dividends of probably 10 per cent as collected by the receiver and ordered by the controller of currency. It will take post \$15,000 for one such dividend. Depositors will be fortunate to secure a dividend every 60 days.

He was adjudged insane today and sent to the asylum. He left this evening, accompanied by his brother, George Humphrey, deputy U. S. Marshal and Deputy Sheriff Halley.

Washburn's circus did a good business in Albany. Their program is not very extensive; but it is clean, and pretty good, though possessing few experts. Complaint was made in Salem that the horses were abused in the Wild West performance; but there was no evidence of it here, particularly in the lassoing, and an Albany man who examined the animals states that there was no evidence of their having been mistreated.
