

THE SMUGGLERS

A dispatch from Washington says that Supervising Special Agent Tingle, of the treasury department, says the government has a good case against the ex-officials of the customs service who have been indicted at Portland, Or., notwithstanding that the indicted men claim that the action against them was inspired by political motives, the purpose being to oust them from office as republicans and to put democrats in their places. Mr. Tingle, who is himself a republican, says that this allegation is untrue. He says the department has been convinced for several months that there was a ring of smugglers in the Northwest. Ever since Inspector Noyes was sent there to investigate and reported that the Portland collector and his subordinates were implicated, and since the reports of Inspectors Wood and Lewis were received, there has been no doubt that the right parties have been caught. Mr. Tingle says he regrets as much as anybody that he had to perform the disagreeable work of detecting these officials in dishonest practices, but he was bound to perform his duty and will push the cases to the end. He says the collector at Portland must have received about \$50 a head for each Chinese he smuggled in. There were 1700 Chinese brought in in all, and the revenue derived by these enterprising treasury officials must have amounted to about \$85,000. It is believed that a majority of these Chinese were admitted on fraudulent affidavits, but the amazing thing about the whole smuggling operations of the customs officials is that they not only required the Chinese who were candidates for illegal entry to pay \$50, but the Chinese who under the law were entitled to enter had to pay as well. Mr. Tingle says that at Victoria the smugglers had regular headquarters, where bogus affidavits were made out and signed with fictitious names, acknowledged before a mythical notary public and a counterfeit notarial seal affixed. In a great many cases the photograph was also attached as a means of identification, Tingle estimates that there were \$500 pounds of opium smuggled in, the duty on which would amount to \$102,000. It was very difficult to catch the boats with the contraband stuff on board. Several times they were searched, but they had been unloaded in the river. The government has been working on this case diligently for months, and only succeeded at last in making out cases against the 15 indicted men by means of some of the guilty ones who volunteered to turn state's evidence. When it was found by the others that these had turned against them, there seemed to be a general desire among the dishonest officials to become witnesses for the government, in the hope that this might grant them immunity from punishment. Several members of the gang almost fell over one another in their desire to become prosecuting witnesses.

Mr. A. J. Mackintosh, discussing the instinct of locality in animals, remarks that it is time to inquire more carefully into the stories about the almost miraculous manner in which animals taken from a familiar spot contrive to retrace their steps. Several remarkable stories of this kind are cited but the writer treats skeptically the currently accepted explanations. "Carrier pigeons," he says, "are taught 'homing' by taking them gradually longer flights from home so that they may learn the look of the country. We cannot always discover that a dog actually was acquainted with the route by which it wanders home; but it is quite absurd to imagine, as most people at once do, that it was a perfect stranger to the lay of the land. To find our way a second time over ground we have once trod is scarcely intelligence; we can only call it instinct, the word does not in the least explain the process."

Europe wants our grain, meat, and fodder crops in large quantities this year to compensate for her bad harvests. The United States has a large surplus of farm products for foreign shipment. Thus does agriculture come to the front, turn the stream of gold from the Old World to the New World, restoring confidence in business and manufacturing circles. True wealth must come from mother earth. The humble farmer with his toil and hardship solves the knotty questions of political economy which confound the brain of the scientist. All the civilized world eat bread and meat and are willing to pay for their sustenance.

Russia has announced to our Government that she will hold a fruit culture exhibition in St Petersburg next year. Such a show should be extensively patronized by American fruit growers. It is unlikely that the finest fruits can ever be largely produced in Russia, and if our best are put on exhibition there they will doubtless secure for us a very valuable market.

It is a manifestation of gall rarely met with when Governor Penney makes a party appeal to vice president Stevenson in view of the fact that the governor used all his might, official and otherwise to defeat the man to whom he makes the appeal.

THE YEARS FOREIGN BUSINESS.

The monthly statement of the Treasury Department for June is one that should strengthen public confidence.

The exports of merchandise were more than for any June during the past six years, and the exports of gold were less than for any June in the past six years.

The imports of both merchandise and gold were greater than for any June in the past six years. Our exports of silver were also far in excess of any previous June.

Our loss of gold for June was only \$1,601,544, as against \$16,635,477 in June, 1892, and \$14,539,494 in June, 1891. It is time for the "gold scare" to die out.

Our total imports of merchandise and money metal reached the magnificent sum of \$996,841,310, while our total exports of wealth were valued at \$955,443,761, showing that our commerce is in a prosperous condition.

There is nothing in this balance-sheet of the year's business with foreign countries to occasion for doubt or mistrust.

The American system of education, especially in the juvenile departments, is undoubtedly superior to that prevalent in England. A British commission is about to visit the United States to note the methods of education which prevail in our public schools. There ought to be more such investigation among ourselves. Those who have examined schools in different American cities find that some are much better than others, and that, too, in points where equal excellence is possible to all. The school journals ought to be read by teachers more than they are.

The governor seems to think that democrats have forgotten that he has no political claims upon the democratic vice president, Stevenson, or for that matter, upon the democratic party. He forfeited all these claims, when, with a spirit of ingratitude without a parallel in Oregon politics, he deserted the party that made him what he was, (not is), and used all his power, official and otherwise, to defeat the election of a democratic president. No; the governor's appeals die on his breath for he has no claim to make them.
