Deputy Sheriff Fraker conducted a sheriff's sale up there Monday and a good baggy and set of harness brought under the hammer exactly \$6.50.

The report of Chief Engineer Sanctuary, of the Roseburg fire department, shows that the department cost the city \$609.00 during the fiscal year ending July 31, 1903. In the same time there were nine fire alarms, the total loss being \$1092; insurance paid \$820. The causes of fires were: explosive lamps, 2; defective flues, 2; careless use of coal oil, 1; cigarette, 1; sparks from locomotive, 1.

Some new comers arrived in Pendleton Saturday, per covered wagon, from Lane county, having crossed the Cascades by the old military road. They were dissatisfied with all the region traversed until they reached Umatilla county, and describe the country after leaving the mountains as dried up and dusty. A gentleman by the name of J Anderson brought into the clerk's office this morning seven coyote scalps, for which he will receive two dollars per head. He was disgusted at the low bounty paid, as he said twenty dollars per scalp would be nearer the amount that should be paid. He killed the coyotes near the summit of the Cascade mountains, in this county.—Eugene Guard.

A Postona, O., dispatch is interesting: A large number of farmers in this vicinity are feeding their wheat to the hogs in preference to selling it at the present low prices. With the prices of hogs ruling as at present, they can realize \$1 per bushel for wheat by feeding it to hogs. The hogs are doing extremely well on this fodder. The big failure of a packing Co. yesterday, though, dropped the bottom out of pork at least temporarily.

Here is the way Roseburg looked at it, according to the Review: "The committee appointed to arrange for entertaining the San Francisco merchants, have decided not to go ahead with the affair. Enough money was subscribed to pay the expenses, but there was some doubt as to the character of the excursion and the benefits to be derived from it. The San Francisco papers state that only a few merchants will come, and that all classes have the benefit of the reduced rates. Our merchants did not care to entertain simply a miscellaneous crowd of ordinary excursionists."

THE MARKETS.—Last night wheat was only 55 1/2 cents in Chicago. In San Francisco Seller Dec. wheat was quoted at 121 3/4 per cental. The Portland report was: Local market lifeless. All exporters report nothing doing and say it is useless to give quotations. The real market value of Walla Walla based at present freight rates of 3 7/8 and 2 7/8 per qr for prompt shipment is 90c free on board, but no doubt some shipper who has cheap tonnage may bid up and pay higher prices to secure grain for early arrivals. All markets eased off at the close and until there is relief from present tightness of money no improvement in wheat values is looked for. A small milling demand exists at relatively high prices. Yesterday 97 1/2c was bid for Walla Walla and \$1.10 for valley. No sales.

A Portland merchant is made to say in the Oregonian that goods can be shipped from San Francisco to Portland and reshipped to valley points and even from San Francisco to Portland and reshipped to valley points and even to Newport at a cheaper rate than from San Francisco to Newport direct over the Oregon Pacific. This is a base falsehood of the extreme kind. The cost of shipping goods from San Francisco to Portland by rail is far more than to Albany by way of Yaquina.
