TO STAY EXECUTIONS.—Governor Penney has addressed a copy of the following letter to each representative and senator, who are members of the present general assembly:

SALEM, Aug. 15.
Dear Sir: Having received numerous communications urging me, in view of the recent financial stringency to call an extra session of the legislative assembly for the purpose of passing a law for the stay of execution on all judgments for one year. I must state that you as a member of the state legislature, would express your opinion as to the advisability of so doing.

Judging from the tone of the press, the general sentiment is against the calling of an extra session of the legislature to pass a law staying executions for a year. The latter now to a great extent is the lack of confidence. Such a law would make matters worse. The present laws are such as to give debtors considerable protection, and it is safe to predict that creditors generally are not going to be very severe on debtors. It would not be to their interest. There is much reason to believe that the present anarchy will gradually give way to better times again developing into prosperity.

RUN OVER.—Last night the three hotel uses were returning from the nine o'clock seal along Lyon street, when the bus of the bus house run over a drunken man lying in the street, who was not seen by the driver on account of the darkness. The St. Agnes bus followed; but was stopped before the man was reached. The motorist just missed the man as it passed. It was found that one of the horses had stepped in the man's face, the imprint of the cork being plainly seen. His lips were cut, his neck badly peeled, and his body bruised in different places; but he was not injured internally, and will be all right with some care as mementos. The man was taken to the office of Maston & Davis, where Dr. Davis dressed his wounds. The victim of the accident is Jeff Pittchford, a young man who was running around with the Big Four darkeys during the day, and was loaded with whiskey. His home is Salem, where his wife resides. Thos Pittchford, of Scio, is his father. Pittchford was placed where he could get sober, and it is hoped will keep so. He left today in company with the darkeys.

FAST DRIVING ON THE BRIDGE.—Yesterday afternoon Bob Meyers, residing beyond Corvallis, near the Lincoln county line, on returning home from Albany, drove his team with greater alacrity across the big bridge than is allowed by law, in fact, at a very rapid rate. A warrant was issued out of Justice Carl's court for his arrest, and on receipt of a telegram, the Marshal of Corvallis took him in charge on his arrival at that city, and turned him over to the Sheriff. A W. McClain went after him; but on his arrival the Sheriff had allowed him to go, and he had done so very speedily. Very properly it is proposed to enforce the law prohibiting fast driving over the bridge.

SECURES A JUDGE.—The welcome news is received that Oregon has been successful in securing the appointment of one judge, at least, on the jury of awards for the World's fair. Mrs R S Wallace, of Salem, has been confirmed as juror in the horticultural department and has been assigned to the department of fruit in jars. She has already entered upon her duties. Information is received that D H Looney probably cannot be appointed judge in the live stock department but may receive an appointment under the agricultural bureau.—Statesman.

A large number of tickets have been sold for the entertainment at the M E church to night. One little girl alone has disposed of about 75 tickets at 10 cents apiece.

Turner and Harritt of the Salem Gun Club recently tied for the medal. Yesterday they shot the tie off, or rather tried to. Each made 23, and will try again next Tuesday.

In Hodges & McFarland's may be seen a globe of two gold fish, one thought is over half silver, and the other has a silver lining, perhaps suggestive of the present financial discussion in congress.

The camps of Rev W C Kantner and F H DeCue, on Nye Creek, Newport, were robbed on Saturday night. Ten dollars in money was taken from the former and a watch and other valuables from the latter. The thief was not apprehended.

John McIntosh killed on the Snake river by the explosion of a steamer, was at one time deputy sheriff of Marion county, and manager of the Oregon Milling Co. He was a son-in-law of Angus Shaw of Turner. He was 46 years of age.

The decision in the Behring sea arbitration is that Russia ceded all rights to the U S, but that the U S has no rights beyond the three mile limit. Suits are to be protected hereafter. The decision is a compromise, and is moderately satisfactory to all concerned.

The City Marshal of Albany has received a postal showing that the circus coming has nothing to do with the big Sells Bros. circus, though Sells is a relative. It is simply a one ring affair, probably of the character of those that have already been here.

Mr A Cohen has shown the DEMOCRAT a circular from the San Francisco association of wool Commissioners, in which they recommend that owners of sheep do not shear at all this fall on account of the low prices.

A foot-race has been made between Elsworth Cameron and Wm Ray, both of this city. The distance is 75 yards and the stakes \$100 a side. The race will be run at Gervais next Sunday. Ray defeated Cameron in a 100 yard race in Corvallis on July 4th.

Alfred Hamilton, who lives a couple of miles across the river from Corvallis, had the misfortune to lose a fine Durham bull on Sunday last. The animal was staked out and got tangled in the rope and his neck was broken. He was valued at \$200.—News

Scio is becoming quite a hop center, about 250 acres being in hops near that city, which means over 400,000 pounds. At over 15 cents a pound there is an item of nearly \$50,000. The price, though, promises to be higher, on account of small crops East and across the Atlantic.

Mr Percy Kelly, representing the district attorney, by request went to Lebanon yesterday to prosecute Mrs Tom for assault on Owen Marlin, the facts of which were given in the DEMOCRAT. On learning the correct facts in the case he very properly refused to bring a suit. Mrs Tom, though, was induced to plead guilty before the recorder and to pay a fine of \$5.

The new time card of the Southern Pacific goes into effect today in consequence of abolishing the Albany local. The overland conductor, Wick Huff, will take the position of baggage master, whose place will be filled by Senior Conductor Guthrie, of the Albany local. The overland baggage master will supersede the present brakeman, and the latter is to step down and out.

WEATHER BUREAU

Crop weather bulletin, No 21, of the Oregon State Weather Service for the week ending Tuesday, August 15th, 1933. B S Pague, local forecast official.

In Western Oregon the temperature during the past week has been cooler by four degrees than it was the preceding week; the sunshine was about normal.

A good soaking rain would be of great benefit to the hops, corn, late grain and fruit, gardens and pastures. The winds are dry, making the soil very dry and hard. Hops have good growth, they are very clean, there being few lice; but the burr is small, produced by lack of rain, an improvement in the size is anticipated. Peach plumes, the early peaches and apples are ripening quite rapidly, usually they are ripe by July 10th. The potato crop is generally good, though it would yet be improved by rain. Harvesting of fall wheat and oats continues, threshing will begin this week. The correspondents all agree that the grain is turning out much better than was expected. Some little threshing has been done, which yielded from 28 to 42 bushels per acre. Spring sown grain does not show much improvement; it will not be harvested for ten days or more, it indicates a yield below the average; not more than 12 to 16 bushels of wheat and 30 bushels of oats to the acre are expected.

Harvesting is in progress throughout the Columbia river counties, in Union and in part of Baker county, in the counties to the south it will begin next week. Some threshing has been done and the yield is beyond all expectations.

There is a general disposition upon the part of all capitalists, bankers, business men and everybody else in Oregon to be lenient.
